We were very fortunate at the start of the month to host the Ontario Masonic annual Education Conference for the first time in the Hamilton Masonic Centre and Norman E. Byrne Cathedral. The day was packed with an excellent lineup of thought provoking talks from a variety of unique

speakers. Feedback from the event has been very positive, which leads me to hope that we will see this event return to Hamilton again in future.

Later in the month, Westmount Lodge No. 671 presented a Traditional Table Lodge event with the Grand Master, M.W. Bro. John C. Green in attendance. The evening saw a full house, complete with fellowship, camaraderie, and Masonic Education. Westmount Lodge later presented a cheque with the substantial proceeds from the event to our Grand Master in the amount of \$5000 for the Prostate Hope project.

Sunday April 24 marked another opportunity to showcase the beautiful Norman E. Byrne Cathedral to our family and friends as we hosted the Spring Divine Service for the first time. This event saw over 220 in attendance, with a large portion of that number being family and loved ones.

The support in Hamilton C of our Grand Lodge was no more evident this year than with the sold out Grand Master's Reception for M.W Bro. John C. Green. This event boasted an impressive attendance of 290+ tickets sold, and I can say that I have never seen an event in Hamilton so popular as this in recent years.

At our mid-term District Meeting an ad-hoc committee was struck and tasked with drafting a Long Range Plan for Hamilton District C. I am happy to report that this committee and I have been hard at work producing a plan which will be presented in draft format at our Spring District Meeting for discussion. While our District Guidelines support the general operation of our District, a Long Range Plan allows us to look to our future from a wider perspective and to forge ahead under a common vision. I encourage all Hamilton District C brethren of all ranks to attend our Spring District Meeting on May 14th for discussion on this and other topics. From the Grand Master

Well Brethren, as we have all experienced, the first week of Spring was more severe winter weather than the winter season.

But we have survived for the most part and we look back on a very unusual weather realizing it has been quite easy getting around. We should have some sympathy for those who enjoy snowmobiling and playing on ski hills.



Brethren, this month I want to focus on a couple items most of us are familiar with, that being the Technological society we experience in our daily life. While we enjoy the benefits of access to information that once took significant time to be distributed we also must be very diligent and respectful of information that becomes available to not only ourselves but also to the general public.

Recently some Masons, who probably thought all they were doing was all in good fun, posed for a less than favourable photo which identified them as Masons and the Lodge where they were members. Not long after the photo appeared on Facebook. The Deputy Grand Master and I received a number of questions and complaints. The main concern was someone on Facebook was presenting to the public - out there before the world - a unenviable opinion of Freemasonry that could easily be interpreted that we, as Masons, might not be the honourable men that we continually strive to portray to the world at large. Brethren, whether the incident was intentional or a bad joke, always keep in mind what you just want to share with friends could easily be re-posted. Someone's idea of humor may be at another individual's expense and possible embarrassment.

The objectives of the Foundation clearly set out its charitable nature:

to receive, maintain, manage, control and use donations exclusively for charitable purposes within the Province of Ontario

• to use its donations for the relief of poverty, the advancement of education and the advancement of other purposes beneficial to the community; and For the Cause of Good

The good works of the Masonic Foundation of Ontario are laid out each year in their Annual Report. Their Annual Meeting is held in Toronto during the week of Grand Lodge's Annual Communication. The Masonic Foundation support meaningful funding for Prostate Cancer Research in Ontario using Project Hope Foundation - Project No. 2550. M.W. Bro. John C. Green is committed to Project Hope for his term as Grand Master. Please support Project Hope – Project No. 2550

The MasoniChI.P. Foundation of Ontario:

A federally incorporated charitable corporation, with its own Board of Directors, held its inaugural meeting in Woodstock on January 7, 2012. I am proud say I was a Founding Director. The MasoniCh.I.P. (Child ID Program) consists of five major components: vital child information; digital fingerprints; digital photographs; a digital video and a dental bite impression. All of this data, except the dental component, is burned onto a CD.

It only takes a few minutes from the time the CD-Rom is loaded into the Police computer for the AMBER ALERT broadcast to be sent throughout their system. All this material and information is given to the parent or guardian. No information is ever stored by the MasoniChIP program.


Although only four years has passed since the Foundation was formed they must now upgrade their computer which presents a significant outlay of funds.

Cornerstone Project

Note:

Editors As a follow up to the long range planning workhop provided below is an outline for becoming a Cornerstone Lodge.The Cornerstone tool kit provides a template and resource planning that Lodges can use to grow and improve the Lodge experience for

all of our members.

This is a summary of the Cornestone approach, refer to the Cornerstone manual for complete description of the required standards. You can access it under the Craft Stewardship tab in the Members area on the Grand Lodge Website.

Concept: derived from the first stone set in the construction of a foundation. Importance: all other stones will be set in reference to this stone

Primary Purpose - to encourage & recognize lodges that: Plan, implement and manage well-rounded yearly programs.

Promote Lodge activities, brotherhood, charitable work and community involvement

Value Added Benefits:

- Increased Lodge vitality.
- Enhanced teamwork.
- Increased sense of pride in the Lodge. ٠
- Greater sense of accomplishment.
- Use of Cornerstone designation.

To qualify, a Lodge must meet:

- 1 of 3 mandatory standards
- 5 of 12 major standards
- 6 of 13 basic standards

Mandatory Standard (choose 1)

Friend-to-Friend Program

- the Lodge holds an event using the Friend-to-Friend Program or another similar format

Mentor Program

-The lodge uses the Mentor Program to enhance the education and journey through the degrees of its new candidates by conducting the Candidate through at least 3 of the 4 Elements of the program as contained in the Lodge Resources Mentor Program material

Officer Mentorship

-The Lodge practices a program that involves Past Masters regularly providing mentorship to its line officers (i.e., stewards, deacons, inner guard, wardens and master)

Major Standards (choose 5)

- Attend at Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.
- Establish an operating budget.
- Conduct 4 Masonic education sessions.
- Conduct all 3 degrees & prove MM degree.
- Distribute 3 written Lodge communications.
- Participate in a Masonic workshop.
- Visit another Lodge (lodge initiative).
- Conduct a lodge survey.
- Participate in travelling gavel visitation program (district initiative).
- Sponsor a MasoniC.H.I.P. event.
- Participate in blood donor clinics.
- Increase average meeting attendance.

Basic Standards (choose 6)

- Invite/host another Lodge (lodge initiative).
- Host social for ladies/widows.
- Recognize 50 year members, Past Masters, etc.
- Interact with local youth group.
- Assist widows and shut-ins.
- Conduct a Rusty Mason or similar event
- Honour new Lodge members or new Master Masons.
- Members and families attend a religious service together.
- Implement a banquet program with proper Protocol and Etiquette.
- Hold a Lodge of Discussion.
- Participate in a community event.
- Hold an Open House.
- Attend a District Past Masters & Wardens meeting or equivalent.

Oualification Period

The Cornerstone Project qualifying window opens on June 1st of each year and closes on May 31st of the second year. Only those events and activities that occur within this two-year time frame will be considered when reviewing the qualifying documentation.

A Lodge Letter of Intent, (ed. note an example is provided n the workbook) must be completed and submitted to the Cornerstone Team Leader, or the Grand Lodge office, no later than December 30th of each year.



The Order of Women Freemasons in Canada

Freemasons

In 2008, The Order of Women Freemasons celebrated its 100th anniversary at Royal Albert Hall in London England. To mark this celebration, the members raised, over the previous four years, 250 000 £ to donate to Cancer research and 250 000 £ to donate to Cancer care.

In Canada, there are four Craft Lodges and one Mark Lodge. They are:

Lodge Pioneer Hope/ Trillium of York No. 72 and 79. This Lodge meets in Scarborough on the second Tues in May (Installation) and June, Sept., Oct., Nov., March and April.

Lodge Heritage No. 84. This Lodge meets in Whitby on the second Monday in May (Installation) Sept., the first Monday in Oct., the second Monday in Nov., Dec., March and April.

Lodge Keele Gate No. 172. This Lodge meets in Port Credit on the last Sat. in May (Installation) and the fourth Thurs. in Sept., Oct., Nov., March, and April.

Lodge St. Lawrence No. 206 is an Installed Masters' Lodge which meets in Scarborough three times a year in Sept., Nov., and April.

Archstone Mark Lodge No. 6 was reinstated in April 2011. It meets in Scarborough on the first Wed. In Oct. (Installation), April, June, and August

As of this year, under the Order of Women Freemasons, Lodges have been established in Canada for 62 years. The first Lodge called Lodge Pioneer Hope of Toronto No. 72 was consecrated in October 1954. In 2014, the Order celebrated its 60th anniversary in Canada with this Lodge. At that time and on behalf of all members of The Order of Women Freemasons in Canada a donation of \$15,000.00 was presented to the Alzheimer's Society of Toronto. This charity was chosen from a list of five suggested by the members of all Lodges and voted upon in the regular meetings of each Craft Lodge by the Brethren who had become members of the Order in that particular Lodge. That same year, Lodge Keele Gate No. 172 celebrated its 50th anniversary. This year Lodge Heritage No. 84 celebrates its 60th anniversary on April 24, 2016 with a special celebration dinner held at the Oshawa Shrine Club on Simcoe Street

Archstone Mark Lodge was suspended in the 1970's. With the work of 14 Brethren who travelled to England and took the Mark Degree with Quarry Mark Lodge No. 19 in 2008 and 2010 and the approval of the Grand Master, Archstone Mark Lodge No. 6 was reinstated in April of 2011. The Canadian Brethren are very grateful to the Brethren of Quarry Mark Lodge No. 19 for their valuable help in re-establishing the Mark Degree here in Canada.

The ritual used in the Craft Lodges is The Universal Book of Craft Masonry published by Lewis Masonic. The Mark Ritual No. 1 is published by the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons. The Mark Ritual No. 2 is used for Installation.

Future goals of the Canadian Brethren include re-instating the Ark Mariner Lodge which at one time was moored to Archstone Mark Lodge No. 6 and the Royal Arch chapter called Golden Triangle Chapter No. 24.


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

The Schematic Lodge Symbolic File Article #9:

Most people at some time in their life would have seen or heard of a schematic diagram. It is simply a symbolic diagram of an operating system. The diagram could be an electrical or a mechanical system. If you are presented with a schematic diagram without knowing what it is for, it is very difficult or next to impossible to determine its use without extensive study.

All the components on the diagram are symbols. Without the knowledge of the symbols a person has no idea of what they are dealing with. Even a person like myself, well trained in the electrical theory would struggle to understand what a particular diagram may be for. Masonry can be considered a schematic diagram. It therefore takes much research, first to understand the symbols and then time to process the information and more time to understand what it is used for.

In order to allow a person this time, Masonry is set up in sections or Degrees. The reason a man cannot understand Masonry after completing the Degrees in one year can be explained through some number symbolism by way of Three, Five and Seven. In the following, I am not talking about dressing stones but learning of One's Self.

Originally it took three years to become an Entered Apprentice. After proving he had learned the "Work" a Mason could be passed as Fellow Craft. This was a five-year study. Again after proving himself as a Fellow Craft he could then be raised to a Master Mason, which would take seven years or more. The Master Mason Degree at that time included the Holy Royal Arch Degree, which is now part of the York Rite.

In today's world this fifteen-year study would amount to a Degree in the field. After proving himself worthy he could gain the title of a "Widow's Son". This would amount to a Doctorate.

As mentioned above, a one-year progression through the degrees presently in place in Masonry does little to prepare a man for the journey to self-knowledge. Therefore considerable research is required.

There is no simple explanation for the inner workings of a person therefore as mentioned, Masonry uses a schematic diagram and symbols. The Lodge is set out in a three dimensional form. Here however we will be looking at it in two dimensions only. In two dimensions, the Lodge is set out in a quadrant from east to west and north to south.

In Article Five I mentioned that the Right Hand Pillar is situated in the west instead of in the north as on the historical temple. This pillar strides the axis line that runs east and west and is represented by the S.W. At the Temple in Jerusalem the High Priest represented it. This gives the S.W. a foot on each side of the axis line (the "Firewall") between the Conscious side of the Lodge in the south, the Outer Man and Unconscious to the North, the Inner Man. One thing further, there is a Working Lodge, which is necessary to get the work done. There is also a Symbolic Lodge, the working of which is set out in the opening of the Lodge. With the information provided through these articles and with a bit of homework, it is time for you to begin to read the schematic diagram.

Some questions are set out below from the Symbolic Lodge just mentioned for you to consider.

- What purpose does the right hand pillar or the S.W. serve in the west on the Schematic Diagram?

- Why does the S.D. only carry the messages and commands of the W.M. to the S.W. and await the return of the J.D. in the northwest?

- Why does he not simply take it to the J.W. himself?

- Why is it necessary for the J.D. to carry the messages and commands of the W.M. to the J.W. (in the South) and return only to the S.W.?

- Why does the J.D. see the messages are obeyed and not the W.M.?

- In what form does the S.D. receive the messages from the W.M. and from where does he receive them?

Answer these questions and you are well on the way to understanding the symbolism of the Lodge and also to "Know Your Self"
