

A Lecture from R.W. Bro. Devin Tuinstra On Hardwood

Brethren, as you may know, my family and I recently moved into a new home this past summer, which is set back a bit from the road, and is surrounded by trees. The most prominent of these trees, is a series of Sugar Maples.

Sugar Maple trees figure prominently within our Canadian Culture, here in Ontario, particularly in the Winter months. Indeed, Quebec and Ontario are respectively the world's first, and third, largest sources of Maple Syrup.

In Canada we celebrate the Sugar Maple tree, and have adopted it, as part of our culture. In winter time, Maple Syrup festivals can be found across this region, even selling maple-leaf-shaped treats for kids. As we all know, this tree's leaf is also found prominently displayed at the centre of our National flag.

One thing that you may not know, however, is that the oldest Sugar Maple tree in the World currently grows in Peterborough, Ontario and is estimated at over 330 years of age. In old growth forests, this great tree, can grow to a height of 110 feet tall, and over 3 feet in diameter.

Brethren, reflecting upon this great symbol within our culture, brings several thoughts to mind.

The first that comes to mind, is the fragility of this tree. A new Sugar Maple sapling, relies heavily upon its surroundings, and environment. It requires water, and sunlight, to provide it sustenance and strength, in order to survive.

The second, is the speed at which this tree grows. A sugar maple tree only grows at a rate of up to 12 inches, in a good year, as it seeks the light, cast through the leaves of trees around it. Over-crowding by nearby trees, can quickly put an end to this young saplings life.

And finally, this great tree is <u>hard wood</u>, and <u>hard wood</u> grows **slowly**, but it grows **strong** – enabling it to weather our harsh winters where other trees **cannot** endure. Brethren, these three paradigms can be easily applied to the new Mason, as he travels through his Masonic journey.

As we all know, many men join our gentle Craft, seeking Light, and full of spark, and energy. Over time however, if that Light begins to elude him, or the environment isn't conducive, to supporting him in his personal growth, his progress quickly begins to wane, then his interest, and slowly his attendance, until he may leave our Craft altogether.


On the other hand, the opposite feelings may occur, where we may expect far too much of our new members. Let's consider for a moment the Lodge, which pays a great deal of attention to its new members, provides Masonic Education, programs, events, and regular practices. These candidates cannot help, but be constantly engaged, enthused, and excited. But then another element creeps into the relationship - that element of expectation, in response to these efforts. Perhaps the Lodge has many Past Master's eager to pass the torch to these new thriving members. These are all very good things brethren, and it can certainly be said that a certain amount of expectation is needed, however we cannot forget, that a man cannot be rushed along his Masonic journey. We all progress at our own pace, and that progression should be supported, and encouraged, though it should come to pass as the members themselves, seek for increased engagement, and responsibility.

Another element to consider, is that of providing room for this member to grow, within the Lodge. Room for his ideas to be heard, and his energy to be applied. When we worry for our future, we naturally as men begin to put policies and traditions in place, which at first, are meant to safeguard the quality and sanctity of our ceremonies. It is however, important that we not let tradition, and the way that we've always done things, stifle the growth and input, of these new members.

Brethren, it is important to remember that hardwood.grows.slowly. If we are to build strong Lodges that will endure through difficult times for generations to come, we must focus on growing hardwood within our Lodges. So quickly we can succumb to the temptation, to urge our new members to take on new roles, though in our guidance if prudence and patience prevail, that man will be far more the better for it.

Masonic Education

GEORGE WASHINGTON'S MASONIC BROTHERS, the SAILOR KING, and QUEEN VICTORIA

(Adapted from WBro. Lorne G. King William IV, who ruled England from 1830-37, was one of George III's seven sons, and one of Queen Victoria's uncles. As the strange, good natured 'Sailor King' was third in line of succession, he had been unlikely to become king, so, as per royal tradition, he joined the navy, at age 13. He was very much one of the tars, and even got arrested in a brawl in Gibraltar. During the American Revolutionary War, he served with distinction, commanding a 600-ton frigate (40 guns). In America, he became best of friends with then Captain Horatio Nelson, a member of Amphibious Lodge in Plymouth, England. When the American 'rebels' hatched a plot to kidnap Prince William, Worshipful Brother George Washington's instructions cautioned against insult or injury to the Prince. The plot failed when the British put an armed guard on William, and thereafter forbade him to walk around New York City unescorted. Prince William joined the Craft shortly thereafter.

Applying himself to his naval career, Prince William became Lord High Admiral of the Royal Navy. One of his escapades was straight out of Gilbert and Sullivan. In 1828, he set out to sea for ten days, with a squadron of ships, without telling anyone. Upon the Admiral Prince's return to port, the Prime Minister, the Duke of Wellington, politely fired him. (The Duke had been a member of Trim Lodge, in Ireland, for nearly 40 years.) While on dry land, the Sailor Prince was an inveterate womanizer. He enjoyed a long affair (1791-1811) with an

Irish actress, Dorothea Jordan, who produced ten illegitimate children. In his efforts to produce a legitimate heir, William made numerous overtures of matrimony to wealthy heiresses and European princesses, but to no avail.

Fifteen years before the birth of the Sailor King, there arose a sense, in England, that the Grand Lodge, founded in 1717, had de-Christianized Freemasonry, and that the two Saints John were being devalued. Their feast days were no longer celebrated as the auspicious occasions for the installation of Worshipful Masters. Accordingly, in 1751, certain disenchanted Freemasons, led by the pretentious and antagonistic Irish Mason, Laurence Dermott, (1720-1791), established a new, more observant Grand Lodge, 'according to the Old Institutions,' and called themselves the 'Antients.' They were influential in America, in Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts, and Canada. Eventually, though, two of the Sailor King's Brothers re-united Freemasonry. Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, became Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England (Antients) in 1813. He was Queen Victoria's father. Prince Frederick, Duke of Sussex, became Grand Master of the Premier Grand Lodge of England (Moderns), also in 1813. Together, they hammered out a compromise constitution. Prince Frederick remained Grand Master of the newly United Grand Lodge of England for 30 years. His brother, King William IV, the Sailor King, served as Grand Patron of the United Grand Lodge of England from 1831 until his death in 1837.

With the death of his niece, Caroline, (1817), and his brothers, Edward (1820) and Frederick, (1827), the Sailor Prince became heir to the British throne, but had no heir, himself. He was finally crowned King William IV in 1830, at age 65, the oldest British monarch to ascend to the throne, until Prince Charles. (age 73). When the Sailor King died in 1837, of cirrhosis of the liver, he had no legitimate heir. Fortunately, his younger brother, Edward, had had a daughter named Victoria, who ruled as Queen for 64 years, into the twentieth century. (1837–1901). Only Queen Elizabeth II has surpassed that feat, ruling for 70 years. (1952–2022).

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
