SOME THINGS WE LEARNED AT THE MID TERM DISTRICT MEETING ON FEBRUARY 7, 2009.

- 13 lodges were represented at the mid term meeting, with a total of 37 members in attendance.
- The Treasurer reported a most healthy balance in the District account.
- 150 from 31 Districts' lodges attended the Districts Divine Service.
- On invite, the District Organist will assist any lodge on its Official Visit or Installation.
- The new Guide is working well for the first 6 months.
- 12 lodges have Masonic Education Representatives. Attendance at Masonic Education meetings is lower than expected.
- The next CHIP (Child Identification Program) clinic will be held at the Ancaster Fair on September 25, 26, and 27, 2009. Volunteers requested, and funding cost donations gratuitously received. - 5 lodges have sponsored Blood Clinics. 369 donations to date, down from previous 2 years. Needs more lodge representative involvement. Can get more clinics if Lodges will sponsor. Lodge Blood Donation reports should be forwarded to Chairman.
- 5 lodges are participating on the Website. Need total lodge participation, so new feature of upcoming degrees can show total District response. Each lodge secretary or his designate can post lodge information. Just 50 % of lodge reps came to the District Computer Training Workshop. Secretaries or reps can come to Chairman's office for training if needed.
- DDGM's District Charity Project, "Hamilton Partners in Nutrition (PIN), has realized over \$3000 by midterm meeting. Make donations payable to the Hamilton Districts' Board of Relief c/o Bob Kerr. Mark memo space as Hamilton District 'C' Charity Fund.
- 4 or more lodges in the Binbrook, Caledonia, Cayuga, and Hagersville area have been victims of spray painted "hateful words and phrases", which is under investigation by the Ontario Provincial Police and the Hamilton Wentworth Police.

It takes but an hour to bring a man into Masonry ritualistically (when he takes the Obligation) and legally (when he signs the By-laws). As the Junior Deacon acted as 'a friend and guide' to the candidate during the ceremony of initiation, every Master Mason is charged to 'afford assistance and instruction' to the brethren in 'the inferior Degrees.' The Past Masters of the lodge have a particular role to play as mentors. The experience, knowledge, and wisdom they possess provide a sound basis to mentor and instruct a neophyte Mason in the 'usages and customs' of the Craft. Who better to answer his questions and stimulate his interest and curiosity?

If every Past Master attached himself to one new Mason, bonded with him as Master and Apprentice, to provide guidance and encouragement, to introduce him to the world of Masonry beyond the limits of his own lodge by visiting other lodges in the District, we would ensure that the new Mason would quickly become an integral part of the lodge. "He who teaches often learns much." The Past Master stands to gain as much as, if not more than, the candidate from this close fraternal relationship.

FROM THE GRAND SECRETARY

With the ever increasing use of record keeping and storage by means of the computer, it is important, for historical purposes, that the lodge secretary ensure the provisions of Section 298 (a) B. of C. and related Form 4 are complied with.

Even if the computer generates and stores the minutes they must also be printed and kept in a bound minute book (glue or stitch backed) and produced as per Form 4. I am advised that any Staples store can provide glue backing of paper materials up ½ inch and a few of them up to 1 inch. A number of printing houses can provide affordable binding also.

Please ensure the provisions of this section are adhered to, "in order that the brethren of the future may know and appreciate the past."

RESTORATION BEGINS ON ROSSLYN CHAPEL

Millions of pounds will be spent on the restoration of Rosslyn Chapel, Scotland, which has seen a surge in visitors in recent years following the interest generated by the Da Vinci Code novel and film, in which it is featured. Rosslyn is well known for its intricate and symbolic carvings, from Christianity and Freemasonry, as well as mythology.

Work will begin shortly on building a temporary visitor centre, as one of the first phases of the £13 million project. Expert stonemasons are expected to take approximately one year to conserve the ornate stonework of the 15th century medieval structure. It is anticipated that all work will be complete by 2011. The main phase of the work will commence during the summer, and will involve the repair of leaded and stained glass and the restoration of the baptistery. New additions and upgrades are planned as well, including visitor facilities such as educational areas and a café, and a new roof will be installed. Visitors will be welcomed throughout the refurbishment work, as it has been planned to create a minimum of disturbance.

FREEMASONRY IN RUSSIA

After more than a 70-years' recess, or "sleeping period" that was due to the laws of the long closed society, prohibiting the very existence of any group, the aims of which were not precisely the same as the aims of governing party, Russian Freemasonry has been revived.

The Grand Lodge of Russia was constituted by the Grand Loge Nationale Francaise on June, 24, 1995, and is now recognized by at least 70 Grand Lodges, including:

- The United Grand Lodge of England
- The Grand Mother Lodge of Scotland
- The Grand Lodge of Ireland
- The United Grand Lodge of Germany
- The Symbolic Grand Lodge of Hungary
- The National Grand Lodge of France
- The Grand Lodge of New York
- The Grand Lodge of Alaska
- The Grand Lodge of Austria
- The Grand East of the Netherlands
- The Grand Lodge of New York State

Perhaps nothing in Russia can whip up public hysteria like the notion of a Masonic conspiracy to take over the country. The word "democrat" has also become a widely pejorative term, and long hair on men is certainly a no-no for much of the Russian public.

Now meet Andrei Bogdanov, a presidential candidate with long, curly hair who heads up the country's largest Masonic lodge as well as the Democratic Party of Russia. At 38, Bogdanov was Russia's youngest-ever presidential candidate, and he ran a long-shot campaign for election as First Deputy Prime Minister. Dmitry Medvedev, President Vladimir Putin's preferred candidate, was Successful. Bogdanov's Democratic

party was also widely seen as a Kremlin-controlled project to draw votes away from actual opposition candidates and give voters a tame liberal option. Bogdanov was truly optimistic that he could draw widespread support among young voters, despite his Masonic background and cascading locks. "We were working for the future," Bogdanov said in an interview at his party's headquarters in central Moscow. "A new generation of voters will emerge with a better knowledge of Freemasonry and with fewer prejudices about it, and about the long hair."

Asked about his Freemasonry, Bogdanov said he keeps it away from politics. "For me, it's more about being a member of a spiritual brotherhood than anything else."

As you know, Masonry in Russia used to be very strongly oppressed during the Soviet period, and due to this and the fact that public oppression still goes on, their web certainly lacks objective and publicly available information. However, things are improving.

I checked with the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Russia, R.W. Bro. Vladimir Nikitin PGSW to learn that at the present time they have 23 lodges in their jurisdiction and that Andrey Bogdanov continues as Grand Master.

WELL INFORMED BRETHREN

(Continued from the February Chronicle)

Here are the answers to fifteen more common questions in regard to their Masonic meanings.

Freeborn. Masonically used in reference to the old Roman sense of being born without slave ancestry. In the Masonic *sense, Freeborn* means without *traceable slave* ancestry, and able to make decisions of ones own ability and judgment.

Golden Fleece. The Order of the Golden Fleece referred to in the Apron Lecture of the E. A. Degree was a celebrated order of knighthood in Austria, Spain and Flanders, founded in 1429 for the glory of the Saints and the protection of the Church. The fleece may also refer to the Golden Fleece of Greek mythology.

Hele. A word that has caused a considerable amount of enquiry and some controversy. It is old Saxon and is pronounced *hail* or *hale*. It means to conceal.

Holden. Ancient form of the word "held." It is good Masonic language to speak of a Lodge as "holden" under its Grand Lodge, or of the Feast of St. John the Evangelist as "holden" on December 27th.

Hoodwink. Commonly used to denote deception, to delude. Masonically it denotes covering, concealing. Supposedly it comes from the days of falconry, when the birds were hooded to keep them quiet until let loose after prey. On being brought

into the daylight, the birds winked, as indeed a man does after taking off a bandage long over his eyes. From this, the expression came to mean a covering for the eyes. Indicating deception is an obvious analogy to the ease with which a blind person may be fooled.

Jurisdiction. The territory and the Craft within it over which a Grand Lodge is sovereign. The word also means the territorial boundaries of the Grand Lodge.

Just and legally or lawfully. Just, complete in all its parts, refers to a Lodge having the necessary furniture and the required number of brethren to open and transact business. Legally or lawfully constituted is a Lodge opened and at work under the laws of its Grand Lodge and its own by-laws. A Master who assembled the constitutional number of brethren, and opened a Lodge without notifying all local members of a special meeting would not have a "legally or lawfully constituted Lodge."

Parallepipedon. A dictionary definition is a prism or solid with six faces, each of which is a parallelogram. A parallelogram is so named because it has two pairs of opposite sides that are parallel.

Profane. Masonically does not refer to blasphemy, but to non-membership. A profane is one without the Temple, not initiated; from the Latin *pro*, without, and *fanum* a sacred place or temple. For Masons, the "profane world" then, is the non-Masonic world.

Rite. A solemn ceremony performed in a prescribed manner. Masonically it means not only the form of degrees, but in a larger sense, the whole system; as the York, Rite, or the Scottish Rite. The word also refers to small parts of larger ceremonies, as the Entered Apprentice rite, the Fellow Craft rite, the Cryptic rite, a Chivalric rite. etc.

Strict trial. Refers to the matter, not the manner of an examination. A trial is *strict* when it satisfies a committee that the one being examined is what he purports to be.

Summons. An order to attend lodge, issued by the authority of the Worshipful Master, or for his members to appear at a special meeting or as a witness to a Masonic trial; commands issued by the Grand Master to appear before him or Grand Lodge.

Tenet. a principle, belief, or doctrine generally held to be true; especially, one held in common by members of an organization, movement, or profession. *circa 1600*

Vouching. The process of informing another that a third is a Master Mason. Cannot legally be done except in the presence of three; the avoucher, the one vouched to, the person vouched for. Properly to vouch for any one, the avoucher must have legal Masonic knowledge, i.e., either have sat in Lodge with the person vouched for, have had him vouched for by one who has, or be present at a properly appointed Masonic committee for examination.

AN OBITUARY PRINTED IN THE LONDON TIMES

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as: Knowing when to come in out of the rain; Why the early bird gets the worm; Life isn't always fair; and maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a 6year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student, only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children.

It declined even further when schools were required to get parental consent to administer sun lotion or an Aspirin to a student; but could not inform parents when a student became pregnant and wanted to have an abortion.

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims

Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realize that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death, by his parents, Truth and Trust, by his wife, Discretion, by his daughter, Responsibility, and by his son, Reason.

He is survived by his 4 stepbrothers; I Know My Rights; I Want It Now; Someone Else Is To Blame; I'm A Victim.

Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone. If you still remember him, pass this on. If not, join the majority and do nothing.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

A lodge requires a strong framework of Past Masters for much of its operation but on occasions a new super-structure might arise. This is best done without a major crisis. It requires a working together of good men and communicating ideas among equals. Change is a difficult process from either side. Tim Horton's provides a quiet retreat for personal reflections.
