Greetings Brethren:

I would draw your attention to a couple of housekeeping items that need to be addressed. Some items bear repeating from year to year and I would ask for your support with the following matters:

Submissions: It must be noted that these submissions are considered confidential and the nominee must not be told that a submission has been made in his name. This can lead to tremendous disappointment later if the Committee is unable to honour the request.

Lodge Officers holding Multiple Offices: The D.D.G.M. must ensure that at Installation, any or all required dispensations have been obtained. Please note the constitutional requirements (section 221) for holding Office and contact the Grand Secretary if you have any questions.

Casual Attire: A reminder to the Lodges in your Districts that there are no “dress down” lodge meetings. Unless specific dispensation has been received, dress code in our Lodges is shirt and tie – preferably a business suit or at least blazer and slacks.

Photographs: No photographs are to be taken while the Lodge is in session. Presentations, etc. can be accommodated by those involved remaining immediately after Lodge for as long as the photographer requires.

Looking Ahead: There is a full fall schedule of Receptions and Anniversaries and we are looking forward to meeting with as many of you as possible on these occasions. In particular, these Lodge Anniversaries offer us an opportunity to rejoice in the legacy which we have been given and also to take time to contemplate the path that, not only our Lodge is following but also the Masonic path along which we are personally travelling.

Our focus at Grand Lodge this year will be in three areas:

Communication: simply put, making an effort to get better at it;

Education: educating not only the great number of new Masons joining us these days, but rededicating ourselves as experienced Masons to re-energizing our thirst for Masonic knowledge;

Condition of Masonry: utilizing our D.D.G.M. reports and our survey results to get the best picture we can of the real condition of Masonry in our jurisdiction, in order to focus our planning and initiatives on being responsive to those real needs.

FROM THE DEPUTY GRAND MASTER

Some may hold the opinion that Grand Rank marks the summit of attainment in a Masonic Career. Don’t be under the mistaken idea that the task of working for the Craft is finished by the attainment of that high rank. Those who now wear the regalia of a District Deputy Grand Master have worked hard to reach this office, and now they must continue to work for the benefit of the Craft as a whole.

Provincial Grand Master, Lord Ampthill at the meeting of the United Grand Lodge of England, April 27, 1932, when addressing the new Grand Lodge Officers said, “Each and every one of you has a definite and constant duty, and that duty is to maintain the honour and dignity of your rank. The badges with which you will be invested is meant to not only point out your superior rank, but also to remind you that it is our particular duty to afford assistance and instruction to all those below you.”

M.W. Bro. Raymond Daniels reminded us in his many talks – it is our responsibility as Grand Lodge Officers, *to serve and to protect*. We are here to serve the Brethren and protect the Constitution.

When you hear the Grand Master or other Grand Lodge Officers speaking of the Members of the Board, they are referring to the 35 elected, appointed and honorary members of the Board of General Purposes. In total, 14 are elected and 21 are appointed by the Grand Master. We are very fortunate to have assembled a team of knowledgeable and well skilled Chairmen, Team Leaders and Committee members.

If a Lodge or Brother in your District needs information or assistance, whether it is for financial advice, Masonic

Education, Long Range Planning, or even help in keeping their Lodge going, I urge you to contact the Grand Lodge Chairman. It won't be a surprise to them when they receive your call and/or request. They are expecting it.

As an example, your District Blood Donor Chairman needs to be in contact with Grand Lodge Blood Donor Chairman, R.W. Bro. David Dainard. Further, Grand Lodge Chairmen, when holding a meeting in your area, will be inviting your District Chairman to their meeting. That's why it is imperative that W. Bro. Eric Lakien has an electronic copy of each D.D.G.M.'s Trestle Board, so that he can forward them to the Members of the Board.

These Brethren are a great resource. They are there to assist you and serve you. Likewise, the Grand Lodge Chairmen need you to be knowledgeable about their committees or the various programs they can offer you and your District Team, and where those programs might have a place in the Lodge or in your District.

Publishing Review Committee

As you start to write your messages for various newsletters in your District, or reviewing articles submitted by the Brethren, you should be aware there is a policy on publishing articles.

In the application of this policy, due diligence is the level of judgement, care, prudence, determination, and investigation that a Mason would reasonably be expected to use when authoring a Grand Lodge publication.

- Ensure that the ritual is not quoted at length, and the secrets not at all.
- Current political and religious references are to be avoided.
- Subject matter supports a positive image of Grand Lodge.
- Subject matter is authenticated and properly authored.
- Material is consistent with and supportive of Grand Lodge publications.
- Information supports the unity, civility, and harmony among the members of our Craft.

The Board of General Purposes passed these guidelines to ensure that no inappropriate articles are published. Our intention is to prevent embarrassing situations to our membership.

Tuesday, November 15, 2011

A Memorial Service will be held on the above date at 7:00 p.m. at the Masonic Centre of Hamilton (4 Queen Street South). Through the District Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Bro. John Johnston, and the District Secretary, W. Bro. Martin Tees, lodges from Hamilton Masonic Districts "A", "B" and "C" will be personally invited through their respective D.D.G.M.s.

It is proposed that the Memorial Service will be held in the Scottish Rite Cathedral, in the Norman E. Byrne Cathedral.

THE HISTORY OF MERIDIAN LODGE No. 687

In 1950, West Hamilton and the suburbs of Ancaster experienced rapid growth. As a result, it was determined that the creation of a new Lodge was required to meet Masonic enrolment requests.

In October 1956, a group of senior masons began a series of meetings which led to the first meeting of Meridian Lodge No. 687, under dispensation, on February 13, 1957. Meridian Lodge No. 687 was instituted and consecrated on October 9, 1957 at the Masonic Temple in Dundas when M. W. Bro. Harry L. Martyn was our Grand Master.

Meridian Lodge continued to meet in Dundas until relocating to Ancaster in 1984.

In its first 53 years, Meridian Lodge has numbered amongst its members: one William Mercer Wilson medal recipient, two Grand Chaplains, one Grand Organist, one Grand Senior Deacon, three Grand Standard Bearers, one Grand Sword Bearer, two Grand Stewards, three District Deputy Grand Masters and one Grand Master, M. W. Bro. Norman E. Byrne.

During 2007, Meridian Lodge celebrated its 50th Anniversary. W. Bro. Roy Metcalfe was Worshipful Master and R. W. Bro. Eduardo Cordero was our District Deputy Grand Master. Several special events were held during the year including an anniversary Lodge Meeting on February 14. On May 9, an inclusive Anniversary Lodge Meeting and dinner was held in Guelph attended by our then Grand Master M. W. Bro. Gary L. Atkinson, Grand Lodge Officers, including the current District Deputy Grand Masters, Worshipful Masters and Brethren of the four lodges that had been instituted in 1957 - Meridian Lodge No. 687, Wyndham Lodge No. 688, Flower City Lodge No. 689 and Temple Lodge No. 690. A second degree was conferred with the work of the evening being carried out by members of all four lodges. To wind up our 50th anniversary year, a ladies night dinner / dance was held at the Scottish Rite in October 20, 2007.

Meridian Lodge continues to be an active lodge supporting local benevolence groups. Regular social activities are held for our families such as an annual Christmas Dinner and regular Ladies Nights. Over the years, our members have participated in hosting annual family picnics and other social events including a pig roast.

Members of Meridian lodge, along with our present (2011 – 2012) Worshipful Master, W. Bro. Stephen Cowell, look forward with confidence to the future.

WHEN IS A MASON A MAN?

Joseph Fort Newton answers this question in the last paragraph of “The Builders,” probably the most popular of all Masonic books, in these words:

“When he can look out over the rivers, the hills and the far horizon with a profound sense of his own littleness in the vast scheme of things, and yet have faith, hope and courage, which is the root of every virtue;

When he knows that down in his heart every man is as noble, as vile, as divine, as diabolic and as lonely as himself; and seeks to know, to forgive and to love his fellow man;

When he knows how to sympathize with men in their sorrows, yea even in their sins - knowing that each man fights a hard fight against many odds;

When he has learned how to make friends and to keep them and above all, how to keep friends with himself;

When he loves flowers, can hunt birds without a gun and feels the thrill of an old forgotten joy when he hears the laugh of a little child;

When he can be happy and high-minded amid the meaner drudgeries of life;

When star-crowned trees and the glint of sunlight on flowing waters subdue him like the thought of one much loved and long dead;

When no voice of distress reaches his ears in vain, and no hand seeks his aid without response;

When he finds good in every faith that helps any man to lay hold of divine things and see majestic meanings in life, whatever the name of that faith may be;

When he can look into a wayside puddle and sees something beyond mud, and into the face of the most forlorn fellow mortal and see something beyond sin;

When he knows how to pray, how to love, how to hope;

When he has kept faith with himself, with his God; in his hand a sword for evil, in his heart a bit of a song; glad to live, but not afraid to die! Such a man has found the only secret of Freemasonry, and the one which it is trying to give to all the world.”

ANCIENT CHARGES OF 1723

I. Concerning GOD and RELIGION.

“A Mason is oblig’d by his Tenure, to obey the moral law; and if he rightly understands the Art, he will never be a stupid Atheist nor an irreligious Libertine. But though in ancient Times Masons were charg’d in every Country to be of the Religion of that Country or Nation, whatever it was, yet ‘tis now thought more expedient only to oblige them to that Religion in which all Men agree, leaving their particular Opinions to themselves; that is, to be good Men and true, or Men of Honour and Honesty, by whatever Denominations or Persuasions they may be distinguish’d; whereby Masonry becomes the Center of Union, and the Means of conciliating true Friendship among Persons that must have remain’d at a perpetual Distance.”

Anderson's Constitutions

In 1723, James Anderson wrote and published *The Constitutions of the Free-Masons, For the Use of the Lodges* in London and Westminster. This work was reprinted in Philadelphia (becoming the first Masonic book printed in America) in 1734 by Benjamin Franklin, who was that year elected Grand Master of the Masons of Pennsylvania. An electronic edition of that work is online. A second London edition, much expanded, appeared in 1738. The work was translated into many languages, including Dutch (1736), German (1741), and French (1745).

In addition to clarifying the rules by which the fraternity was to be governed, Anderson's Constitutions contained a History of Freemasonry which claimed that the Craft was very ancient. He traced the fraternity's history from the Medieval guilds of operative stonemasons through various Roman and Greek builders and mathematicians, all the way back to biblical roots.

It is now recognised that Dr. Anderson's story of the Craft is based on mythical tales and legendary traditions, and is quite controversial. However, Anderson's claim that Freemasonry dates back to ancient times continues to be repeated to this day.

THE CORNERSTONE PROJECT BENEFITS BOTH MASONRY AND YOUR LODGE

Grand Lodge, in conjunction with the Grand Master's theme of "raising the bar", has instituted a programme called the Cornerstone Project. Its primary purpose is to encourage and recognize lodges that plan, implement and manage a well-rounded yearly lodge programme that promotes lodge activities, brotherhood, charitable work, and involvement in the community. It is based on the concept that the cornerstone is the first stone set in the construction of a masonry foundation and is important because all other stones will be set in reference to this stone, thus determining the position and strength of the entire edifice.

The true purpose of this initiative is to challenge lodges to rise above their current standard, or raise the bar, and set new standards by which they are judged by their members and others.

The programme is not a one-time event. It is an award that is presented on a yearly basis after the lodge has met the requirements: one of three mandatory standards, five of eleven major standards and six of twelve basic standards. Successful lodges will be designated Cornerstone Lodges at the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge with certificates presented to the winners.

Mandatory Standard (choose 1)

Friend-to-Friend, Mentor or Officer Progression Programme

Major Standards (choose 5)

1. Officers attend Annual Communication of Grand Lodge
2. Establish an operating budget
3. Utilize officers' mentorship programme
4. Conduct 2 of the 3 degrees
5. Members visit another lodge
6. Conduct Masonic education programme
7. Participate in a district workshop
8. Conduct a lodge survey
9. Distribute 3 written lodge communications
10. Participate in travelling gavel or other visitation programme
11. Blood Donor

Basic Standards (choose 6)

1. Special Event to recognize PMs, 50 year pins, etc.
2. Invite/host another lodge
3. Host social for ladies/widows
4. Hold banquet to honour new members
5. Masons and families attend religious service
6. Hold lodge of discussion
7. Visit youth programme or hold meeting with them
8. Conduct Rusty Mason or similar event

9. Assist shut-ins/widows with chores
10. Implement banquet programme with proper Protocol & Etiquette
11. Participate in a Community Event
12. Hold an Open House

COLLEGE OF FREEMASONRY Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario

The College offers three Masonic Education Distance Learning courses:

D.D.G.M. Preparatory Course Masonic Arts and Science Course Preparatory Course for Aspiring Worshipful Masters

A brief synopsis of all is shown below:

1. **D.D.G.M. Preparatory Course**
Cost: \$50.00

This course is open to all Master Masons. The course is composed of three sections, which, when completed should provide a good grounding in the duties, responsibilities and possible problems, that you might encounter as a District Deputy Grand Master or Grand Registrar. Because knowledge is basic to your success it is anticipated that the information contained within this course will be of assistance to you.

1. DUTIES AND LEADERSHIP:

This section deals with the D.D.G.M.'s responsibilities as a capable leader and his knowledge of the Book of Constitution.

2. ADMINISTRATION, FINANCE & COMMUNICATIONS:

This section looks at policies of Grand Lodge and individual Lodge management practices with the intent to produce a knowledgeable administrator.

3. PROTOCOL, ETIQUETTE & RITUAL:

This section pertains to Protocol, Etiquette and the Ritual, which if not addressed thoughtfully and applied with fairness, propriety and respect, may make your tenure difficult no matter how proficient you have become in every other aspect of your duties. As we alluded to earlier, all eyes are upon you. Do not take Protocol, Etiquette and the Ritual lightly.

Note: The amendment to Section 50 of the Book of Constitution reads as follows ... Section 50 (b) ... "A candidate for the office of District Deputy Grand Master or Grand Registrar shall be in possession of a certificate of completion of the course for prospective District Deputy Grand Masters as offered by the College of Freemasonry."

This amendment will be immediately applied to those standing for election as District Deputy Grand Master or Grand Registrar at the July 2011 Annual Communication.

2. Masonic Arts and Science Course

Cost: \$40.00 per Module or \$135.00 for all four

“.....and without neglecting the ordinary duties of your station, to consider yourself called on to make a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge.” - from the Charge to the Newly Initiated Candidate.

This course is for all who have reached the rank of Master Mason.

The College offers a series of four modules leading to the designation “Fellow of the College of Freemasonry”. (F.C.F.) The FCF designation can be used on Masonic business cards, name tags, etc.

At the conclusion of each programme, a certificate of achievement will be awarded to indicate the successful completion of such programme.

In broad terms, the programme is designed to give a Master Mason a greater understanding of the Craft at all levels. Normally, a student will complete the programme in 24 to 30 months, although many entrants achieve a final result in a shorter period of time.

Readily available reference material, among them the Book of Constitution, will enable the student to find the correct answers.

1. MASONRY AT WORK:

Discusses the Masonic Foundation: Benevolence and the Board of Relief: Masonic offences and how they are handled. Chaplains and religion in Masonry: How Lodge and Grand Lodge Committees are set up and how they function. General review of Lodge Buildings and Fraternal Relations.

2. HISTORY AND ORIGIN OF MASONRY:

As indicated by the title, this section is an in-depth study of the growth of Masonry in Canada, including its tribulations, from the inception of the Craft to the present time.

3. ADMINISTRATION AND ORGANIZATION:

Should it be a business or an organization such as ours, neither will succeed without a plan and a strong foundation. Here we look at how Grand Lodge and individual Lodges are organized through good management and sound business practices in each jurisdiction, to produce and develop knowledgeable masons.

4. PREPARING FOR LEADERSHIP:

Whether a student aspires to the “Officer line” in Masonry, or simply wishes business growth in supervisory or managerial skills, this portion of the programme will prove to be invaluable. Herein, much thought is given to motivation and effective leadership, together with hints on speaking and writing effectively.

To sum up, perhaps this quote, from a graduate P.D.D.G.M., will express the worth of the course: “Although portions of the course caused me to dig deep, I have enjoyed every minute of it. My only regret is that I did not take it prior to my election as D.D.G.M. Had I done so, many of the questions posed to me during my term could and would have been answered with greater conviction and authority.”

Preparatory Course for Aspiring Worshipful Masters:

Cost: \$50.00

The Lodge Officers Course is for those Masons who have aspirations for the Office of Worshipful Master of a Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction. The course is composed of three sections, which, after completion should provide a good grounding in the duties, responsibilities and perhaps problems you might encounter as the Worshipful Master of your Lodge.

Since knowledge is basic to your success as a line officer in your lodge it is anticipated that the information contained in the course will support you in your journey to the Chair of King Solomon.

The three sections within this course are:

1. DUTIES AND LEADERSHIP

As the representative of your Lodge in your District, you will have a busy but exciting year. It will be imperative that you exhibit proper leadership within the District in general and within your Lodge in particular. By and large, most of your duties and responsibilities are defined and delineated with the Constitution of the Grand Lodge and the By-laws of your own Lodge. You should become thoroughly familiar with both of them.

2. ADMINISTRATION AND COMMUNICATIONS

The Worshipful Master is responsible for overseeing the governance and administration of the Lodge. The Worshipful Master is the bridge between the Lodge, the District and Grand Lodge. As such, the Worshipful Master is responsible for implementing the directives and policies of Grand Lodge. Thus, the Worshipful Master should be a capable administrator.

3. PROTOCOL AND ETIQUETTE

This section pertains to Ritual, Protocol and Etiquette, which if not addressed thoughtfully and applied with fairness, propriety and respect, can make your life difficult no matter how proficient you have become in any other aspect of your duties. As we indicated earlier, all eyes are on you. Do not take Protocol and Etiquette lightly. It is important that you know what we are dealing with in this section.
