From the Grand Master

wrap ups, strawberry socials and so on. Masonically, before we actually slow down, we had some busy times in June, with many Districts holding annual Installations. But as the Masonic year begins move to a more relaxed summer schedule, it is time to reflect on our Masonic accomplishments of the past year. Our Grand Lodge chairmen have compiled their reports, as have the D.D.G.M.s and we look forward to our Annual Communication where

we highlight those accomplishments and set our plans for the next year.

As Grand Master, I would like to express my appreciation to the Members of the Board who have given their time to serve as your Committee Chairmen, Committee Members and Ambassadors for Grand Lodge. We appreciate all their efforts, and thank them for their contributions and wish them a relaxing, enjoyable summer. I would also like to thank all our District Deputy Grand Masters who have acted as Representatives of the Grand Master in their respective Districts. Thank you for managing the District teams; thank you for completing your reports and thank you for the time and effort you have given in the service to your Brethren.

There are several specific items that I would like to address in this Communique. They are not Housekeeping items, but rather items that will **significantly** impact this jurisdiction in the months ahead.

1) Website Development: The website development team under R.W. Bro. Richard Kaufman is making great progress with Phase 2 and I have been informed that we are counting on an initial release of Phase 2 just prior to Grand Lodge. I have seen the drafts and I can tell you that I am excited by what I see. I can promise you that you will not be

disappointed in the direction in which we are moving. Keep your eyes open for the announcement!

2) Tactical Plan 2012–2013: It seems like a long time ago when we completed our survey. We promised you the results would be used and I am certain that you will find the project initiatives on the plate for next year, reflective of not only our collective long term strategic goals but also of the comments you expressed in your responses. The Tactical (operational) Plan for 2012–2013 will be presented to the Board for approval in July. Once approved, it will be communicated as widely as possible so that all of you can see what your Grand Lodge will be working on over the next year. I trust you will find that these initiatives demonstrate our **commitment** to bringing value added services to you; demonstrate your leadership's **accountability** for achieving our Vision and contribute to **ensuring** the Timeless Vitality of Freemasonry in Ontario.

3) Lodge Buildings: For many, many years, this Grand Lodge has wrestled with the increasingly poor conditions of our Lodge meeting places. Financial concerns, safety concerns and liability concerns among others are causing increased headaches not only within our Lodges but within our Grand Lodge. The time has come when we, collectively, must take whatever actions are necessary to ensure we do the very best we can to avoid any major accidents.

Therefore, **effective immediately, all Lodges and Temple Corporations must begin the process of seeking current compliance to all fire, health, safety and municipality code requirements.** As this will take time and be a very difficult process in some cases, we will require compliance be attained by the third Wednesday of July 2013. All Grand Lodge Committees that have mandates related in any way to this compliance will be actively engaged over the next few months in helping us all to understand the process for compliance, what compliance means and how it is to be achieved and proven. These committees will be required to communicate to all Lodges so that they, in partnership with you, the Brethren who own and operate these premises, can embark on the path to compliance as soon as possible. Together we must act now!

Looking Ahead: As I look forward to our Annual Communication next month, I remind you of **our commitment to provide effective and sustainable leadership to Ontario's Masonic community.** "Our" includes you and me. Be sure you take the time to determine if you are selecting the most capable and qualified leaders for your Grand Lodge next year. Be an informed voter.

Special Announcement: I am delighted to be able to inform you that Bro. Chris Hodapp, author of "Freemasonry For Dummies" has agreed to speak to our Grand Lodge on Wednesday afternoon, July 18th. Plan now to come and hear this distinguished Masonic author and speaker. Check out his website.

Who's In Charge Here?

***Meridian Lodge, No. 687
W. Bro. Stephen Cowell***



Stephen was born in Windsor and raised in Maidenhead, Berkshire, England. He competed in singing competitions as a boy and recorded several records. After graduating from high school in 1965, he went to work for the BBC in London to pursue musical interests. He quickly became enamoured with their computers, reportedly the most powerful in the UK....and less powerful than a modern Blackberry...and became a computer programmer.

While implementing computer systems as a systems analyst for Rank-Xerox in their European manufacturing plants, Stephen was hired by Bell Canada and brought to Toronto in 1977. He settled in Brampton, where he helped set-up and was elected President of a rate payers group. Running for City council in 1982...he came second in a "two-horse-race". He joined Unity Masonic Lodge, No. 710 and the Rotary club in 1980.

In 1985 Stephen was hired by the Region of Hamilton-Wentworth as their Systems Manager, and went on to play a key role in the merged City/Region organization. Relocated to Ancaster in 1986 and joined Meridian Lodge in 1991. His systems/consulting career as a Practice Manager with CGI in Toronto reached a crossroad in 2001 when CGI was taken-over and the management team let go. He discovered a "new calling", became licensed as a Financial Advisor and is enjoying working one-on-one with clients through Manulife Securities.

Stephen served as W.M. of Meridian Lodge for a second time this past year, stepping in to help fill a vacancy in the line.



The Life of Sir Allan Napier MacNab

Lieutenant Allan MacNab (1760-1830) served during the American Revolution as a lieutenant of cavalry in Simcoe's Queen's Rangers. He was wounded a number of times. After the war he came to Upper Canada and settled at Newark. It was there, on 19 February 1798, that his son, Allan Napier MacNab, was born.

In 1800 the family moved to York (now Toronto) where young Allan was raised and went to school.

Following military service (at a very young age) in the War of 1812, he studied law. He was called to the bar in 1826 and set up practice as Hamilton's first lawyer.

His first election to public office in 1828 marked the start of a long career in public service that was interrupted briefly in 1829 when he spent ten days behind bars following the burning of an effigy of the Governor.

He acquired large tracts of land in Hamilton which was growing rapidly. In 1835, he built Dundurn Castle as his private residence, a magnificent regency villa at the head of Lake Ontario. It is still standing and has become a museum and historic site. MacNab was named Upper Canada's first Queen's Counsel in 1837.

He was one of the leaders in suppressing William Lyon Mackenzie's uprising. Possibly his best known exploit was the destruction of the *Caroline*, an American boat that was supplying the rebels who were on an island in the Niagara River. The ship was cut adrift and sent over the Falls. The incident earned him a knighthood.

Sir Allan was initiated into Masonry in St. Andrew's Lodge, Toronto, on 14 December 1841, and was passed to the Second Degree in the Barton Lodge on 12 January 1842. While still a Fellowcraft, he was named Provincial Grand Master of Canada under the Scottish Constitution. He was finally raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in St. Andrew's on December 29, 1842. He received his patent from the Grand Lodge of England as Provincial Grand Master for Canada West in 1844.

When his installation as Provincial Grand Master was to take place on August 9, 1845, Sir Allan MacNab objected to the proposal that he should be obligated as Provincial Grand Master, claiming that his patent of authority was sufficient obligation for the faithful discharge of the duties of his office. All the others present agreed that a spoken obligation was imperative and that without it, he could not be recognized as Provincial Grand Master. He then assented with the words, "I suppose you're right, Bro. Richardson. You'll have your own way."

He had served as Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada from 1837 to 1841, and was Speaker of the Parliament of the United Canada from 1844 to 1848. In 1854, he became Prime Minister of Canada. He was invested the following year as a baronet by letters patent from Queen Victoria. Also, he was appointed an honorary aide-de-camp to the Queen and received an honorary commission as a Colonel in the British Army. Because of poor health, he resigned as Prime Minister in April 1856 and as a private member the following October.

He served as Provincial Grand Master until September 9, 1857. The next day he was installed Grand Master of the newly-formed Ancient Grand Lodge of Canada.

On 14 July 1858, he took part in the amalgamation of his group with the Grand Lodge of Canada. After that date, he never entered a lodge again.

MacNab was elected in 1860 to the Legislative Council, of which he was chosen Speaker in 1862. He soon returned to Dundurn however in ill health. He died 08 August 1862. Even in death he was the centre of controversy, for he was said to have been a deathbed convert to Roman Catholicism. He was twice married, having one son (who died young) and three daughters.

In general, MacNab seems to have risen to the top by being a manipulator and trimmer, with few scruples. One historian sums him up in these chilly words - "Inept at planning and organization but a promoter and enthusiast in many commercial, military and political schemes, MacNab cultivated an image at the expense of substance and his triumphs had about them a hollow ring."

Sir Allan MacNab was a busy man, not lacking in ability, but he certainly had no particular affection for Masonry except as yet another vehicle for preferment. His appointment as Provincial Grand Master was due to political influence. His attendance at lodge communications was sporadic and his knowledge of the Craft shallow; again e image without the substance. His neglect of Masonry was less damaging however than that of Jarvis or of McGillivray because by now there was a core of devoted and skilled Masons in the province to provide effective leadership for the Provincial Grand Lodge.

Note - Prior to 1763, what we today think of as Ontario was part of New France. Between 1774 and 1791 it was part of what was known as Quebec. Between 1791 and 1841 it was known as Upper Canada, between 1841 and 1867, as Canada West and in 1867 became known as Ontario.

The Craft Association of Hamilton Masonic Districts

The Labyrinth

Recently I saw a wonderful movie, “The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel”. In it one of the characters says “It will be all right in the end, and if it isn’t, it’s not the end!” This rather pithy saying reminded me of a talk I gave last year when I was District Deputy Grand Master. It was about the thoughts I had after seeing the labyrinth at my church. I have shortened the talk for the purposes of this paper.

A labyrinth is a convoluted pathway leading to its centre.



There are an infinite number of designs but all have an entry point and there is only one path that will lead eventually to the centre. All you have to do is follow the path. Professor Gailand MacQueen writes: “From ancient times, the labyrinth has been used in rituals at the most important moments in life. Although we don’t always know exactly how, its structure, as well as its placement at gravesides, seacoasts, and healing sites, suggest that it was used in rituals associated with birth, coming of age, marriage, sickness and death, as well as initiation into secret societies or elders’ groups. Like all rites of passage and initiation ceremonies, walking the labyrinth is structured as a pilgrimage with three parts. First comes the journey inward, toward the sacred space where change happens. Next, time is spent at the centre, where the new life begins. Finally, there is the journey outward, the return of the transformed person to the world, often with a new identity.”

Our operative brethren felt them important enough to add to their architectural splendours and to put their marks on them.

Like our rituals in Freemasonry, walking the labyrinth is a symbolic journey. It is a metaphor for life. In a labyrinth there is only one path. The only decision you make is whether or not to start. The path has many twists and turns but it steadily and surely takes you to the centre. However it takes you many places before you get there. Most

labyrinths make you walk in a general clockwise direction, just as we do in our perambulations. The winding path of the labyrinth is much like the journey of Freemasonry.

You can trust the path to take you to the centre eventually, no matter where you happen to be at the moment. Thus, the labyrinth is a powerful symbol of the unity of our life path and of the centre that awaits, wherever we are on the path. Alternatively, we might say that the labyrinth is a symbol of God, who is both the centre we seek and the path that gets us there.

Like being in the tyled recesses of a Masonic lodge, walking the labyrinth is a peaceful reflective pursuit. During your journey you think on your life, where you have been and where you want to go. By the end of the walk, you know yourself better, something Masons are admonished to do. It represents a good journey through life: it enables us to have a virtuous clean and wonderful life.
