The following paragraphs, which may be of interest to all Masons, are extracted from the most recent D.D.G.M. Communique.

“Ontario Mason Magazine: Welcome to the first issue of our online Ontario Mason and I congratulate the Editor, W Bro. Daniel Dignard and thank all those responsible for its e-publication. Brethren, like it or not, we are in an age of electronic communications. In today’s social media networking, we need to use all available mediums to communicate with our members. The task of the Communications Committee and the Editor of the on line Ontario Mason is to bring you up to date with the new age of electronic communications.

Cast your minds back to the mid 1990s and just think for a moment, how many members of your lodge were using computers or, indeed, if the lodge secretary even possessed a computer! How dramatically different it is today. The internet has had a radical impact on our everyday life, including the rise of near instant communications by electronic mail, instant messaging and the world-wide-web, with its discussions forums, blogs, twitter and social networking. The internet continues to grow, driven by even greater amounts of online information and knowledge.

The Birth of Our Grand Lodge

“To form perfect fraternal union and harmony, establish order, ensure tranquility, provide for and promote the general welfare of the Craft, and secure to the fraternity of Canada, all the blessings of Masonic privileges; it is expedient, right, and our bounden duty to form a GRAND LODGE OF CANADA.”



With this resolution the Brethren of forty-one Lodges from Canada East and Canada West assembled in the Masonic Hall in Hamilton on October 10, 1855,

brought into being the Grand Lodge of Canada. This was a bold and courageous step by the colonial Brethren.

“We the representatives of regularly warranted Lodges here in convention assembled – Resolve that the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Canada, be, and is hereby formed upon the ancient charges and constitution of Masonry.”

The first order of business was to prepare a new constitution. William Mercer Wilson was duly elected as Grand Master for the ensuing twelve months. The Grand Lodge was consecrated and the Grand Master installed on November 2, 1855 by M.W. Bro. H. T. Backus, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Michigan.

The former Grand Secretary of the United Grand Lodge of England, R.W. Bro. Dr. James Daniel, (Honorary Grand Secretary of our Grand Lodge) in his research into colonial Freemasonry of the period, pointed out that the Grand Lodge of Canada was the first Grand Lodge in the Empire to be recognized by the parent Grand Lodge of England after declaring independence. That is a singular distinction of which we should be immensely proud.

Thirty Lodges joined the new Grand Lodge. The Ancient Grand Lodge of Canada, successor to the

Provincial Grand Lodge of Canada West, continued until 1858, when articles of union were approved by both Grand Lodges on July 14, 1858, and the Ancient Grand Lodge was declared dissolved and fraternal union was achieved.

Following Confederation in 1867, when four Provinces constituted the Dominion of Canada, the Lodges in Quebec passed a resolution on October 20, 1869, that “The Grand Lodge of Quebec of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, be, and is hereby formed upon the Ancient Charges and Constitutions of Masonry.”

In 1885 a committee to review the Constitution recommended that the style and title of Grand Lodge be amended to ‘The Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada in the Province of Ontario.’ When the revised Constitution was adopted in 1887, the name became official, and so it remains to the present day.

Today, our Grand Lodge occupies a position of respect among the Grand Lodges of North America. We are the largest Grand Lodge in Canada with more members than all the other nine Grand Lodges combined.

As we celebrate the 158th Anniversary of the founding of our Grand Lodge at this season of Thanksgiving in 2013, we must be grateful for the determination, perseverance, and dedication of our founding fathers. We must never forget the debt we owe to those who have come before us. However, “Do not follow in the footsteps of the men of old; seek what they sought.” (Matsu Gasho) It is our solemn duty to perpetuate the legacy for a season.

District Charity Update

The "Coldest Night of the Year" will be held Saturday, February 22, 2014. The concept was created in 2011 featuring two walks, one in downtown Toronto, the other in Kitchener-Waterloo. It is an education piece about homelessness and poverty. The concept is quite simple; while walking in the cold, we understand what it must feel like for those less fortunate than us. Two, Five and Ten K walks are offered. Teams are organized and pledges gathered.

In 2013 the Kitchener walk alone raised over \$150,000 and across the country CNOY raised \$1.6 million with 38 cities taking part. It is expected that in February 2014, 65+ organizations and cities will take part including the Neighbour to Neighbour Centre in Hamilton.

DDGM's Observations at the District Meeting

Brethren, since assuming the office of DDGM I have been very warmly received into the lodges of this great district on the occasions of both my Fraternal and Official Visits.

During this time, I have also made some observations that I wish to share in an effort that we may correct any irregularities and maintain a high level of excellence in our Ritual Work. Please feel free to share this with the brethren with your lodge.

1. **“Worshipful Sir” versus “Worshipful Master”**: The Master of the Lodge is always referred to as “Worshipful Master” unless stated otherwise in the Book of the Work when conducting a degree.

2. **Current Grand Lodge Publications**: To ensure consistency and compliance with the requirements of Grand Lodge, it is necessary that we use current editions of the following publications; Book of the Work 2013 / Ceremony of Installation 2012 / Constitution of G. L. 2011.

3. **Closing of the Lodge**: Lodges are encouraged to practice according to the current version of the Book of the Work. The Italicized portion of the Ritual explains this in detail.

4. **Official Visit**: The occasion of the DDGM's Official Visit to a lodge is referred to as an Official Visit and Not Inspection.

5. **Masonic Titles**: The correct acronyms are M.W. Bro. Smith / R.W. Bro. Smith / V.W. Bro. Smith / W. Bro. Smith and Bro. Smith. It should be noted that titles and Masonic rank are never used on envelopes that travel through Canada Post or public conveyance.

6. **Candidate's Name**: If the pronunciation of a candidate's name is unclear, please ensure you are familiar prior to introducing at the head table or presenting during Ritual.

7. **Head Table Introductions**: I have always felt it is unnecessary to give compass directions on the location of the individual you are introducing. Introducing head table guests in the correct order, by rank and name is sufficient. They will stand when identified. This becomes easier to remember names rather than locations.

Brethren, as always, thank you for your consideration and support.


