"W. Bro. Nick Andras: One member is trying to make a difference to make his Masonic Home a better and safer place to meet. I wish to take this opportunity to congratulate Adoniram Lodge No. 573, Niagara B District and W. Bro. Nick Andras who has written and published a hard-covered book containing Masonic Poetry, titled: "Through the Eyes of a Brother". Being a proud Freemason, his passion for the Craft has been expressed in this collection of poems. Each poem was written throughout his Masonic journey and is an honest glimpse of how Masonry has touched his life. His works have also been featured on many websites and his poem entitled "Being a Mason" was printed in the fall 2009 issue of the Ontario Masonic Magazine. W. Bro. Nick Andras has dedicated this book of Masonic Poetry to the restoration and repair of Van Alstyne Place, Niagara Falls, a building in which his lodge meets in addition to two other Masonic Lodges, a Scottish Rite and a Cryptic Rite. He is donating 100% of the proceeds of all book sales to this cause. If one member can make a difference, just think what we can do, collectively. President Abraham Lincoln once said: "I like to see a man proud of the place in which he lives. I like to see a man live so that his place will be proud of him!"

Instead, civil dialogue allows all voices to be valued, including those that may be of a perceived minority view."

John Aasen _A giant 8' 6" tall who, when raised in Highland Park Lodge No. 382, Los Angeles on July 14, 1924, weighed 536 lbs. The raising was done by Arthur S. Crites, G.M. and all ritualistic ceremonies were observed except that 12 craftsmen were required. Fifteen hundred witnessed the ceremony. Aasen appeared in a number of motion pictures including The Circus. – First entry in **10,000 Freemasons** by William R. Denslow Volume 1 - A - D.

From the Deputy Grand Master

"I would like to address Masonic Education as the lodge program of the month. Brethren there are several aspects of education in our fraternity.

- 1. We all wish to take pride in performing our ritual to the best of our ability. The indication that an individual has shown their best effort exemplifies the genuine interest in Freemasonry. It is important to understand the work you are presenting not just recite it without meaning. The valuable part of our ritual is not only knowing the work but understanding the meaning of the presentation. This requires considerable education from the senior members of each lodge to explain their interpretation that has been passed down from generations.
- 2. We also have a variety of programs such as the College of Freemasonry that offers studies to improve your knowledge through the courses available. The FCF course includes a wide number of issues to better inform the member on a more in depth study of our fraternity which you can share with other members and thus make Masonry stronger and more knowledgeable in general. The Past Masters Course entitles you to be eligible to be nominated for District Deputy Grand Master or Grand Registrar.

I am aware that there has been controversy over this program in last number of years but I like to inform you that while meeting with a number of current DDGMs recently, they related to me, looking back, that they were glad they took the course whether or not they had become DDGM, because they were now better informed masons. So brethren, whether you plan to attain a Grand Lodge Office, or just become a more informed brother, you will find the Past Master's course valuable to your Masonic interests.

3. Brethren the other aspect of education is our historic information that is made available in a number of venues. Our Masonic Library at Grand Lodge in Hamilton has endless varieties of books available to any Mason. We are also hoping to introduce a new manner to access their information with a new electronic capability that would be a possible link to the website for your convenience.

The Sankey Lectures are now an annual event that takes place at Brock University each spring and is open to Masons and students. There have been a variety of speakers who have shared their Masonic knowledge and that will continue in future years. This fall Grand Lodge will be embarking on the third annual Masonic conference in the Toronto area after successful events in Ottawa and London. This is a full Saturday that offers different presentations of Masonic subjects of general interest. If you are interested in increasing your knowledge of the craft, I believe you would enjoy attending such an event."

Hamilton Masonic District C **Blood Donors Committee**2013 - 2014

2013 - 2014 Final Report



The Committee is pleased to report that our partnership with Canadian Blood Services continues to strengthen, not only by the financial contributions made by all the Lodges, but also by the number of volunteers from the District, working at hospitality stations of several clinic sites in our communities. Also, this year, through the leadership of W. Bro. David Macdonald, co-chair of the Blood Donors Committee, the District was successfully involved in the negotiations to reopen the Hamilton Convection Centre Clinic. The Canadian Blood Services have learned to depend on our support and know they can count on us when it comes to saving lives.

For the first time in the history of this committee, all thirteen Lodges in the District assisted the C.B.S. financially to a total of \$1800.00. Although the C.B.S. is partially financed by the government, monetary donations are always greatly appreciated.

This year C.B.S. needed to close the newly open clinic at the U.S. Steel site on Wilcox Street, which was being manned by Hugh Murray Lodge No 602. At the same time, C.B.S. assigned the hospitality station at the Redeemer University clinic to our District. This clinic now operates two days in a row every other month and is being temporarily manned by the Brethren from Meridian Lodge No. 687.

The District is happy to report that 2000 units of blood were collected during the 2013-2014 at clinics which were sponsored and/or manned by Hamilton Masonic District C. The committee would like to give many thanks to all the Lodges which this year made it possible for the District to strongly assist the CBS. Special thanks also go to those Lodges who not only generously supported the programme financially, but also provided volunteers to man the hospitality stations at six different sites throughout the year.

These Lodge are: Hugh Murray Lodge No. 602 for the U.S. Steel clinic (29 units), and the 35 Stone Church Road clinic (170 units), Temple Lodge No.

324 for the 35 Stone Church Rd. clinic (170 units), Buchanan Lodge No. 550 for the Hamilton Convention Centre clinic (592 units), Meridian Lodge No. 687 for the Paramount clinic (382 units), Redeemer University clinic (259 units) and the McMaster University Medical Centre clinic (568 units) and finally, the District's Blood Donors Committee wants to thank W. Bro. Robert Todd who has always been willing to help at a very short notice when others were not available.

This committee will attempt, for the future term, to encourage other Lodges in the district to permanently man the hospitality stations at the Redeemer University. McMaster University Medical Centre (MUMC) and at the C.B.S. Head Office in the Meadowlands, Ancaster, 35 Stone Church Road.

Finally we regretfully are aware that R.W. Bro. Eduardo J. Cordero will be retiring this year from his post as co-chair of the Blood Donors Committee. The Committee will be left in the very capable hands of W. Bro. David Macdonald who will assume the leadership.


