The Masonic Past Masters' Association of the Hamilton Districts

A Brief History

In 1902, the Past Masters of the lodges in Hamilton District 8 instituted an association to promote visitation and harmony among the Past Masters of the district. As a result of continual interest and growth in Masonry, District 8 was divided in 1923 into Hamilton A and Hamilton B and by 1974, it was necessary to create a third district, District C. Throughout this time, the Past Masters' Association held to its mission of promoting, developing and disseminating the principles of Masonry and the opportunity for fellowship and education.

As of March 2019, the Association has 205 members with an almost equal balance of Officers, Directors and members from each of the three Hamilton districts. The D.D.G.M.s of Districts A, B and C are all ex-officio Directors of the Associations, as is the president of the Craft Association of the Hamilton Masonic Districts. The membership fee is a nominal amount making membership accessible to all past masters. Membership has great advantages.

Over the last few years, our meeting format has evolved into four breakfast meetings and a Friday Night A.G.M. in May or June. The breakfast meetings have always included an interesting guest speaker. Our A.G.M. dinner meeting gives the brethren an opportunity to meet those brethren who are running for the various offices of Grand Lodge. This is always a highlight and the new executive of the Past Masters' Association are chosen.

As a member of the Past Masters' Association, you will find that it, like the York and Scottish Rite, is part of our logical progression through Masonry. On the night of our initiation into Masonry we may have initially found that we were surrounded by many men that we did not know, but it soon became apparent that these fellows were going to become friends. As we became more involved within our lodge, we discovered these friendships grew, so that we became brothers. By accompanying our D.D.G.M. on his official visits, we met and got to know Masons from the other lodges within our district.

The Past Masters' Association provides that further opportunity to expand our Masonic contacts, meet brethren who have also had the experience of being Worshipful Master and learn about and visit lodges within the other Hamilton Districts.

THE RISE OF FRATERNAL ORGANIZATIONS

Series Overview

The last half of the 19th century saw large amounts of social change, migration, industrial revolutions, massive urbanization and much higher levels of productivity, profit and prosperity. Electricity, the telegraph, the telephone, and the light bulb appeared. Railroads changed the way people travelled and obtained goods. Labourers were the origin of numerous fraternal organizations especially among new immigrants to United States and Canada, influenced by earlier English mutual aid societies. These British guilds, fraternities and unions date from time immemorial. Some of these organizations took on the character of convivial clubs, which met periodically, made their contributions or paid their fees to the general fund, and appointed a committee of officers to manage their affairs. In England an effort was made to put them on a firm footing by granting them legal status.

A fraternity or fraternal organization is an organized society of men associated together in an environment of companionship and brotherhood; dedicated to the intellectual, physical, and social development of its members. It differs from a fraternal benefit society which is a voluntary association formed to provide mutual aid, such as insurance for relief from sundry issues. Many major financial institutions today, particularly insurance companies, and credit unions can trace their origins back to benefit societies, and they can trace their organizational structure built upon models of fraternal orders such as the Freemasons and the Oddfellows. Historically, benefit societies emphasize the importance of social discipline, conforming to the rules of the organization, and acting in a morally uplifting and ethical manner. Conviviality and benevolence are important principles, employing a mutual exchange of privileges and removing the stigma of charity.

In the United States and latterly Canada, arose a great number of societies having mutual aid as their focus. The order of Freemasonry was probably the oldest. As a rule, the majority were short lived and purely local, while some grew to national proportions. With the introduction of government social welfare in the early 20th century, membership in benefit societies declined, but still continues to provide supplementary social and healthcare coverage. Conversely, signs and ceremonies have become the mainstay of fraternal societies that no long focus on mutual aid.

New technologies have provided yet more new opportunities for humanity to support itself through mutual aid that might be described as networked affiliations that produce collaborative projects within communities. Habitat for Humanity is a leading example of shared credit and labour pooled to help low-income people afford adequate housing.

Our Hamilton |Districts' Past Masters' Association has John Gerrard, the CEO of Habitat for Humanity speaking of its visionary and progressive work they are accomplishing in our community, on Saturday |March 14, 2020.

Grand Lodge Strategic Planning Toolkit

To assist Lodges in the development of their Strategic Action Plan, a toolkit has been developed by R.W. Bro. Kelly Feldkamp. This is a very comprehensive tool covering every topic that lodges are scored on when completing their "Lodge Report Card". This toolkit can be found at the following website; https://www.sptoolkit.org please copy and paste the URL into your favorite web browser.

An explanation of the toolkit is found in the document titled "Strategic Action Planning Guide"



Why a Toolkit?

The Strategic Action Toolkit is a bridge between where you are and where you want to be. It is organized according to the Condition of Masonry Lodge Report Card. The toolkit directs your attention to the many resources Grand Lodge and others provide to help your Lodge improve. It provides an index and a document of action for continuous improvement.

What is the Condition of Masonry Lodge Report Card?

The Lodge Report Card is an annual assessment of the state of each individual Lodge focusing on 5 categories with a total of 22 subcategories which are:

Membership

- Officer Progression
- Growth (initiations)
- Member Attendance All Meeting
- Visitor Attendance Regular Meetings
- Average Number of Visitors OV and Installations

Visitation and Events

- Community Involvement
- Lodge Special Events
- Lodge Social Activity
- Lodge Members Visiting

Education, Ritual and Protocol

- Masonic Education
- Ritual Work
- Observed Protocol during Official Visit

General Administration

- Updated Books, Current Edition of the "Work"
- General Maintenance and Care of Exterior
- General Maintenance and Care of Interior
- General Maintenance and Care of Furnishings

Planning for the Future & Finances

- Long Range Planning
- Resident Dues
- Members 12 Months in Arrears
- Operating Surplus or Deficit
- Recurring Operating Losses
- Level of Investment/Reserves

The Lodge Report Card scores are based on information provided by the L Forms submitted to Grand Lodge. The Strategic Action Toolkit is meant to help the Lodges to utilize the information in the Report Card more effectively.

What is the Strategic Action Toolkit?

The Strategic Tool Kit is not meant to add to the large volume of tools available to the lodges. Rather, the toolkit is meant to add some organization to how the member Lodges utilize the tools already available to them. The Strategic Action Toolkit centralizes many of those resources into one website. It is tied directly to the Condition of Masonry Lodge Report. The website contains one page corresponding to each of the 22 items evaluated for the Lodge Report with specific action plans moored to it. When a lodge looks at the Report Card, and sees, for instance, that it is "at risk" for Growth, it can then go to the toolkit and search for specific recommendations for what programs or resources could help them to improve in that area. The tools you choose to make use of in order to address your opportunities will be determined by the Strategic Action process we will outline below. The result is that the Lodges can now focus their attentions on the activities which will have the best chance to lead to improvement.

What Lodges can benefit from this process?

All Lodges do something well. All lodges also have areas where they can improve. Every Lodge, whether achieving Healthy, Conditional or At-Risk status on the Condition of Masonry Lodge Report can identify those areas of improvement and "move the pea forward".

How Will the Strategic Action process work?

This is a practical approach to Strategic Planning. A plan alone is pointless without action to bring it to life. For this process, the starting point is Lodge Report Card from the Condition of Masonry Committee. Facilitators will assist lodges the lodges with navigating the Strategic Action Toolkit. They will guide lodges but should not be involved in the execution of any plans, nor provide oversight. They are a resource to help the lodges to focus on evaluation phase, while the lodge will provide the impetus for execution.




This is my photographic record of our much-loved Temple where we have met for over 29 years. It seems fitting to create a pictorial record for all to view and recall the fond memories for years to come.
