From Our District Deputy Grand Master Opportunity within Challenge

That disclaimer out of the way, I ask, do you look at our current fraternal paradigm and see an opportunity or a challenge?

Many of us have found alternative, albeit temporary, means to exercise our fraternal bonds during these past 18 months. The presentation titled "Observations on Gold," began with some interesting facts that detail the specific attributes of gold. Inspired by previous lectures held on the Forum, Jason provided some key insights into his Masonic Journey.

R. W. Bro. McCulloch was able to link the Hamilton Chronicle article published in July to the forum presentation. Taking the Hindu legend of Mankind's hidden divinity and using the writings of Albert Churchward, an author and Freemason to begin to frame out how Masonry inspires us to "Dig for Gold" in all the right places.



Grand Master's Address July 2021 (An Extract)

To the Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Brethren.

For the second year in a row, COVID-19 has prevented us from holding this meeting in person. So that the brethren of the future may know and appreciate the past, the



Grand Historian has ably documented the effects of the pandemic on the functioning of lodges and Grand Lodge, and the responses that were so effectively taken. I commend R.W. Bro. Michael Jenkyns for this report and all the other work he has done for the Craft as he retires from Grand Lodge office.

This has been a year unlike any other. Lodges have not met in person at all.

For some it was a year of isolation and loneliness, for some a time of frustration, for some, a time to read, a time to contemplate what it is about Freemasonry that attracts us, and for some a time of great challenge.

Yet we have overcome. We have all overcome.

We had a huge pivot to videoconferencing. Previous to the pandemic Grand Lodge had investigated the use of videoconferencing for the Board and committees to use to alleviate some of the travel involved in meetings, and to help with inclement weather. Little did we know how useful that would be. We were able to quickly change to meeting on-line which allowed the Grand Master's COVID response team to meet regularly as well as, eventually, the Management Committee, the Board and all Grand Lodge committees. Being shut up at home with time on their hands several committees started meeting weekly. The amount of work they accomplished was incredible. Virtually all of our programs have been reviewed and updated, several moved to on-line formats, an updated Strategic Plan has been created, and we have thoroughly planned and assessed the long awaited Information Technology upgrade for the office. An Accessibility policy was adopted and on-line training for all staff, DDGMs and the Board was implemented.

Lodges and Districts have also taken to on-line videoconferencing and webcasting for educational lectures as well as social interaction. We have joined and hosted top-notch speakers from around the world, and some of our members

have given presentations to international audiences. It has been fabulous for Masonic enlightenment.

There have been over fifteen brethren who have completed the distance learning Masonic Arts and Sciences Course during the lockdown and now are Fellows of the College of Freemasonry. Five of those brethren began and finished their studies during the lockdown.

Because of the uncertainty of whether we would be able to gather today, early on we started planning for the contingency of requiring virtual proceedings. An interesting convergence occurred in that the Board had been working since 2019 on some proposed changes to the Annual Communication such as online voting from home and this year we have been forced into trying it. This will give us an idea of whether we want to move permanently to this method.

AD HOC TASK FORCES

Annual Communication Task Force

The Annual Communication Task Force under the capable direction of the Grand Treasurer continued the work started at the previous Crieff retreat and made a number of recommendations. Highlights are:

Electronic voting.

Election of the DDGM to be conducted in the district or from home.

Board Meeting to be conducted as a separate virtual meeting in June.

Annual Communication - Two-day format (week-end vs. week-day).

Flexibility for location of Annual Communication.

Another task force be set up at a future date to consider Regionalization. Constitutional amendments were proposed to enable these proposals should we wish to proceed with any of them.

Three Ouestions Task Force

A task force of members from a variety of faith traditions convened by the Grand Chaplain at my request last year looked at some aspects of our Ritual from a theological standpoint. The Ritual Committee weighed their suggestions as well as other considerations and made changes which will be forthcoming in the new Book of the Work when it is reprinted. Since the changes are pretty simple (although very significant) I announced them in the December Communiqué.

Corporate Review Task Force

R.W. Bro Murray Coulter, with the help of R.W. Bro. Lou Domjan, R.W. Bro. Jim Sutherland and outside counsel, has reviewed our situation in regards the Ontario Not-for-Profit Corporations Act. It was discovered that our Grand Lodge Corporation had not enacted an organizational by-law at the time of incorporation in 2010 nor at any time since and that the ONCA will prescribe for us a "default" by-law if we do not enact our own. The proposed form of "By-Law No.1" contains provisions specifying that the "members" of the Corporation are the same persons as comprise Grand Lodge, identifies its directors and officers in accordance with corresponding positions in Grand Lodge and states that the terms of the

Constitution will apply to any matters not otherwise specified in the by-law.

RULINGS OF THE GRAND MASTER

To meet the contingencies this year I had to allow some deviations from the Constitution. In addition to the powers given them last year, the Worshipful Master, Secretary and Treasurer of each lodge were allowed to authorize the remittance of the dues of any member without requiring notice of motion or a vote (with the proviso that it be ratified at the next regular in-person meeting). As time went on, further adaptations were needed to allow lodges to vote on By-Law updates, building issues, amalgamations, and unfortunately, closings. And still more in order to vote on-line for DDGMs, Grand Lodge officers and Constitutional amendments, and to enable this Annual Communication and a transition to the incoming team.

The United Grand Lodge of England considers that the two women's Grand Lodges in England would be completely regular except that they admit women. They do not foresee ever recognizing them, nor any inter-visitation, but they are aware of the public relations advantage of working with them on information campaigns. Indeed, we have found that a substantial number of the inquiries coming to us via the BeAFreemason.org system and our own website, are from women. Rather than bluntly turning them away, we have been referring them to the Order of Women Freemasons, the body which has lodges in Ontario. I see this as a positive move in raising our public image.

After discussion with the Oshawa Temple Building Corporation, I have granted permission under Section 150 (b) of the Constitution for the Heritage Lodge No. 84, Order of Women Freemasons, to continue to use the Oshawa Temple Building craft lodge room for their meetings and ceremonials.

Our ongoing relationship with the M.W. Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario and Jurisdiction has been of great benefit to both us and them. It is noted that unfortunately we do not have similar relations with most of the Prince Hall Grand Lodges in the United States. To start to rectify that, we have written to the Prince Hall Grand Lodges that are recognized by the M.W. Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario and Jurisdiction, that border on Ontario, asking if they would be interested in pursuing mutual recognition. The Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania at their mid-year session unanimously voted to extend recognition to our Grand Lodge. Our Grand Secretary, in the report of the Committee on Fraternal Relations, will recommend that we extend recognition to them. We also happily look forward to good relationships with the other Prince Hall Grand Lodges as they become able to meet to consider our query.

The third wave of the COVID-19 pandemic is subsiding and with the miracle of rapid vaccine development it is now looking like we may be able to resume lodge meetings in September. All lodge secretaries will want advice in August so they can send out a summons; more information should be forthcoming from the Province by the end of this month so we will send out a bulletin as soon as we can. Since we still do

not know when having large gatherings will be wise, we cannot book dates for Anniversaries and Grand Master's receptions yet. The Grand Secretary will let you know when we can start to consider them.

A century ago as we were coming out of another pandemic, we saw a rapid growth in our numbers. Listen to the words of M.W. Bro. Frederick Harcourt in 1921:

"Our membership at June 24, 1921, is estimated at about 88,000. So far as the number is concerned, it is most gratifying to those who wish to see our Order grow rapidly. I must confess that I am not one of them. I feel at times apprehensive that this abnormal growth may react unfavourably on us at some time in the future ... May my fears be groundless. Still, brethren, I must again sound the note of warning... Historical instances innumerable can be given of what has been aptly called 'The imbecile tyranny of numbers."

Imbecile tyranny of numbers. I wonder what he meant. For the past several years I have railed against an obsessive focus on declining numbers, but I think our past Grand Master was referring to something else, the opposite in fact - letting ourselves be overwhelmed by trying to take on more members than we can adequately manage. And I think in fact that his fears were justifiable. The huge spikes that occurred after each World War lessened the ability to properly mentor new members. And a generation later poorly mentored brothers could not themselves mentor others as they had no grounding to look back on. We became a social club that does community charity work. Those things are good but we could be so much more. And we may be in the same situation again – we already have a huge waiting list through our website and

BeAFreemason.org, and I'm sure there are individual lodges that have lists of men we don't even know about. As we return to our labour let us recall the words of E.F. Schumacher and look at lodges "As If People Mattered", not at the economics of running a building, a fund-raising machine, or a political hierarchy. That is, let us thoughtfully and methodically initiate, befriend and mentor, then pass and mentor, then raise and mentor new brethren, and continue to mentor them as they pass through all the stages of this life.



Protocol and Etiquette Thank you to R.W. Bro. Crutcher

After 14 years and 69 editions, many submissions and presentations on Protocol and Etiquette R.W. Bro. Gordon Crutcher has taken a step back. We at the Chronicle want to recognize his dedication and his contributions to Masonic P&E. Here is his Bio, Links to his work and a heart felt thank you.

Ranking after his love of family and friends, Gordon has two additional passions in his life – insurance and Freemasonry. His 54 year (and still counting) career in the Property and Casualty insurance business has embraced all aspects of the business. His profession involved designing and selling high-level



reinsurance programs - "insurance for insurance companies" - to insurers across Canada.

Gordon was a senior executive with one of the largest insurance companies in the world, a company with some 50,000 employees. Gordon was a Senior Vice President with that company, and a member of its Board of Directors. Gordon is currently President of an insurance MGA/wholesale company that places coverage on behalf of other Insurance Brokers.

In addition to making numerous speeches during his insurance career, Gordon engaged in extensive volunteer activities at all levels of the industry. He holds the industry's highest academic designation. After several years on its Governing Council, Gordon was elected Chairman of the Board of the Insurance Institute of Canada in 2000, an organization with over 100,000 members. In 2002, Gordon received the Insurance Institute of Canada's highest, non-academic distinction, its Award of Merit.

Gordon is an honours graduate of the University of Toronto, with a Specialist Degree in Economics. Since joining the Craft over 36 years ago, Gordon has served as the Worshipful Master of his lodge in Thornhill on three separate occasions. His other Masonic activities include having been a member of the Grand Lodge of Instruction team since 2003 and Chairman of the Protocol & Etiquette Committee since 2007. In these two roles, he has made dozens of speeches and presentations to brethren throughout this entire Grand Jurisdiction. He is also the editor of a monthly educational newsletter called P&E Essentials.

Gordon has been a Member of the Board of General Purposes since 2009. And he assures us there is no honour greater, no experience more humbling, than having being elected to the Board twice now by his fellow Masons.


