You may find a little inspiration to keep going. Fraternally,



## From the Grand Master

An allegory, with apologies to L. Frank Baum and Gregory Maguire

Once upon a time there was a quaint village by the sea. The people who lived there were gentle and happy, and very social. They loved getting together for banquets and festivals, and always governed themselves by all gathering in the town square to debate issues. One day they were hit with an incredible storm; it rained and rained



and rained. The streets began to flood. Rubber boots were in high demand down at the local Mercantile and soon sold out. They got more in but there were some people who said "It's just a little rain. That never hurt anybody." But it wasn't just a little rain. It was a lot of rain. And in addition, due to pollution in a neighbouring area, it was acid rain. If it got in your boots it started to irritate your skin causing inflammation. It was autumn and with the cooler temperatures, wet feet led to chilblains. Most people got over these conditions by themselves or with the help of the town doctor, but it was suggested it would be better to prevent problems by keeping their feet dry. This was harder than it seemed. Mothers told their children to wear their rubber boots when out, and they did, but when they were playing and running around some invariably fell, or got their boots stuck in the mud. Even the careful occasionally got wet when their playmates ran past them and water splashed up and into their boots. Spray from passing wagons soaked those walking alongside the road. The fishers and outdoors enthusiasts had hip waders which allowed them to take over the essential work needed to feed and keep the townspeople safe.

On the west edge of town lived a delightful woman who had a skin condition that was severely affected by water. Even a little bit of water would cause necrosis of the skin. She dealt with this by wearing long dresses and a wide-brimmed hat whenever she went out. But since the village was by the sea, it was often damp, so she mostly stayed in her castle. She was actually very nice, but her appearance and isolation led to the townspeople fearing her. Her sister had a physical disability that made it difficult to stand. For short periods she could get by with special orthotic shoes, but she often used a wheelchair. Neither of these sisters ventured out during the storm, the one for obvious reasons, the other because the wheels of her chair sprayed water up onto her when they rolled. They lived on opposite sides of the town, but kept in touch by means of crystal balls in which they could see and talk to each other. Other people in town also had this technology but they didn't use it much, and certainly not with these two marginalized persons.

The rain continued and the flood waters rose. The Mayor decreed that everyone who did not have hip waders must stay inside. The people did the best they could, but some had water pouring into their homes. There was much distress. Eventually the flood waters receded. And the Mercantile got in another

shipment of rubber boots — enough for everybody. Hooray, everyone was protected and life could go back to normal. Alas, the rain intensified and the flood waters rose again. But the rubber boots kept everyone's feet dry. That is, until the level of the flood waters rose above the tops of the boots!

Brethren, with high levels of COVID circulating in the community even the fully vaccinated still need to mask, physically distance and limit their social contacts. We all miss meeting in lodge but one of the things that Freemasons do is work for the betterment of society. Stay safe and keep others safe too.

Brethren,

In the summer we had great hopes for a return to our labours in the fall. Since then vaccination rates have stagnated, the pandemic has reared its ugly head in Western Canada, and restrictions have not been lifted in Ontario. We do not know when the Province will move into its Exit Step. Our public health officials have consistently said that even those who are fully vaccinated should continue to wear masks, physically distance, and LIMIT THEIR SOCIAL CONTACTS.

Freemasons are committed to doing what is best for society and Grand Lodge has always kept the health and safety of our members at the forefront of our thoughts. Meeting in person is not essential to Masonry – we can stay connected in so many other ways, so we are extending the moratorium on in-person meetings. How long is up in the air, dependent on vaccination rates, level of infection in the community and government regulations.

For planning purposes we have now extended the moratorium on in-person Masonic gatherings, including memorial services, until January 1, 2022.

We continue to monitor all developments in health and safety regulations and if the situation changes before then, we will reevaluate.

Outdoor social gatherings will still be allowed if they follow all the government regulations for Step 3, which include a written safety plan, signage about symptom screening, attendance lists for contact tracing, cleaning protocols, size limits and physical distancing. More if food is served.

A reminder that graveside services are not allowed by Grand Lodge.

Lodges and Districts are encouraged to continue to use available telecommunications technologies for education, social interaction, and, if needed, discussion of lodge business within the parameters that have been set up. If your lodge has not used these before, please contact your DDGM for details.

#### Brethren.

I had written a Communiqué message only a few weeks ago with suggestions on re-opening, however as of the time of writing, the Province has paused the exit from the Roadmap to Reopen and we remain in Step 3. I don't know when we will resume the exit plan and be able to lift the moratorium on inperson meetings, so it doesn't seem appropriate to publish that message at the moment; I will save it for later.

There however are some simple things you can still do:

I ask that you continue to reach out and greet your brethren, by phone, by email, or even by post. Call your mentor and have a chat. Lodge officers should divide up the membership list and call EVERY brother so they know they are remembered and appreciated. Keep the list so you can call them again to invite them to lodge when we do return to labour. Call the men on your waiting list.

Call the widows of your lodge.

Continue to sign in to videoconferences. There are many that occur regularly. Check the events calendar on the Grand Lodge website to find an interesting one. If you are planning one, make sure it gets on that calendar by contacting the Seminars and Workshops Committee at Rickcadotte@hotmail.com.

Form a column of mutual defence against the pandemic by following all the provincial, municipal and Masonic guidelines. Please don't try to bend the rules/get around them. Look to the spirit of the law; it is there to protect us all.

Keep your brethren in your thoughts and prayers. Extend compassion to those who are lonely and those who are overworked, those who are suffering and those who are trying to relieve it, those who are at high risk and those who are vaccine hesitant. As M.W. Bro. John Green has often said, "In a world where you can be anything, be kind".

Think twice before posting on Social Media. Name calling and vicious "discussion" does nothing to uphold a brother's honour, nor that of the Craft.

Have Patience. We will rise up again.

Make the best of the present. Stay safe.

# From the Grand Secretary

Brethren.

#### **Resumption of labor:**

A repeat of the August 11, 2021 directive that is still in force: "The moratorium on indoor meetings will end if and only if we go into the Provincial Exit Step, or September 01, whichever comes LATER."

As of this writing it appears that the Provincial Exit Step will NOT happen by September 01.

Thus, with the continuance of the Masonic lockdown there are several important reminders.

#### **Outdoor Masonic Events:**

The Province is presently permitting outdoor gatherings of larger numbers. However, please be aware that ALL health regulations must be observed – over and above masking and social distancing.

You are encouraged to read the information found at this link: <a href="https://www.ontario.ca/laws/regulation/200364">https://www.ontario.ca/laws/regulation/200364</a>

We suggest that you pay particular attention to Schedule 1 items 2.(3)(a) [signs] and 3.3(1)[Safety Plan], and Schedule 3 item 1[numbers limit].

Contact tracing should also be a key factor in holding any such event at the present time.

Finally, **dispensation is required** for outdoor gatherings of Masons (with or without regalia).

Book of Constitution: Sec.143. Except at Masonic Memorial Services, no public procession or function of the brethren as Masons, with or without regalia, shall be allowed to take place, without a dispensation from the Grand Master.

### **Masonic Memorial Services:**

Please remember that, regrettably, the holding of Masonic Memorial Services is still not permitted.

#### **Long Service Pins:**

Our office staff will once again start to receive requests for long service pins. Appropriate care must be taken to obey all local health regulations if these pins are to be presented inperson. Please remember that presently indoor Masonic gatherings are not permitted.

# From the Deputy

### My Brethren:

The last time we were preparing The Communique, I was hoping the next one would be able to scream WELCOME BACK!!! – speaking of our Lodge meetings. It is now looking like we will have to settle for welcome back to The Communique and our Lodge virtual meetings.

What we need to be doing now in preparation of going back to Lodge is to communicate the expectations and what we can each do in preparation for that happy day.

One of the most important jobs during this period falls on the Grand Lodge Mentoring Committee and the new class of District Deputy Grand Masters. The task of the Grand Lodge Mentoring Committee has not changed in the last two years and that is to assure every Lodge has the properly trained Mentors and the tools so that every level of the membership has the proper training to perform his job – from the Worshipful Master to the man off the street who has shown an interest in Masonic membership.

One of the key instructions to the new DDGMs is to be the lightning rod of this objective in every District. They have been asked to meet with the outgoing DDGM to obtain all his knowledge of the District Mentoring that has taken place in the previous two years. This will include the work of the District Mentor and the Roving Mentor(s). It will also include an update on the mentoring endeavours of each of the Lodges in his District.

They will be compiling a list of all the Lodge Mentors in the District by Lodge with their contact information and adding to this list any brothers in the Lodges who would seem to have the qualification and interest in Mentoring.

If the previous District Mentor is continuing, there is to be a discussion with him about the plan and procedures for the coming year. If he is capable and performing in the role, he has been asked to continue in the role. It is important that the appointment of Mentors is well considered and not just given to a friend with a passing interest or future ambition. If the former District Mentoring Chair was not wanting to continue, every attempt is to be made to find the best qualified replacement in the District, and to consider any others who could serve as Roving Mentors for the region.

The first and most important task of the District Mentor is to liaise with his Roving Mentors and as quickly as possible get to work with the Lodges. The District Mentor is to ensure that every Lodge in their District has a capable and active Mentor(s) appointed and that he has their contact information to communicate directly with the Mentoring Material (including previous copies if he is new to the job) and be advised of District Mentoring and Mentoring Committee events that he ought to attend. If you are a part of this team, you have probably already been in touch with W. Bro. Joe Johnson, Mentoring Committee Communications, (joej@ca.ibm.com) has charged who been communications for the Grand Lodge Mentoring team. Please rest assured that the protection of your contact information is in good hands and you can trust with confidence that such information will only be used for Mentoring communication.

You need to keep in mind that the role of the Mentoring Committee is to Mentor the Mentors at every level in our structure – Candidates and Officers. The Mentoring Structure can only achieve that with the DDGMs on board. And they will only be successful with your support and cooperation.






