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### **Our District Deputy Grand Master**

"My Destiny is Entwined With Yours".

Brethren, Sue and I recently spent a Sunday afternoon at the McMichael Gallery in Kleinburg. The McMichael is most famous for its extensive collection of Group of Seven artwork however, beyond that, they have a serious commitment to Canadian art at large.

During our visit, we enjoyed an installation by Canadian photographer/artist Meryl McMaster who is based in Chelsea, Quebec. McMaster is Nêhiyaw from Red Pheasant



Cree Nation, a member of the Siksika Nation as well as of British and Dutch heritage. Her work is predominantly photography based, incorporating the production of props, sculptural garments and performance, forming a relationship that transports the viewer out of the mundane and into a space of contemplation and introspection.

While walking through the exhibit, we came upon this photo and I did not find it too difficult to begin thinking about and exploring the connection between cultural throughlines, mentorship, the title of and the subject matter of this photograph itself.

There stands the artist in traditional dress, staff in hand, her back to us. Through these instruments I suspect we are meant to think about the long path, more than a nod to history, travelled to arrive at this moment. The artist has arrived on the backs, the efforts, of her forebearers. After resting our eyes on the subject of the photo, the viewer's eyes may then move beyond the solitary figure and begin to take in

the expanse of the landscape before the artist, before us all – the colours, the shapes and contours of both above and below. A future stretching beyond more than what the eye can see but not so far as to not be able to feel in one's bones the possibilities.

The relationship between past and future, cemented in the present.

McMaster then brings our perspective back to the in between, in one respect frozen in the moment of 'now' but in another, ready to embark – armed with her experience, her past, her traditions and her dreams. This moment in time at which she stands is also, it bears pointing out, at some sort of cliff or ledge or precipice. There is the rub – the tension – of the photo. Nothing about the future is a given or is guaranteed.

Brethren, I have delivered six papers during the months of January and February at your Official Visits – the two most recent focusing on Mentorship. The first was focused on what it takes to be a successful mentor and the companion paper on what it takes to be a willing mentee. The companion paper also celebrates the magic which occurs when both take place.

Mentorship, built upon the past, empathy, work ethic, enthusiasm and brotherly love will get us from here to 'there'. I hope we enjoy the path as our destinies are truly entwined with those who have come before as well as those yet to join us.

# From the Grand Master February Communique

My Brethren:

I submit to you that never in the history of mankind has there been greater need for leadership. Never in the history of churches, our service schools. clubs and government has there been greater need for leadership. Freemasonry is by no means exempt in this need as well.



A few years ago the University of Michigan did a study in terms of the greatest fears and problems in society. They came up with a top ten list, but for our purposes, I need only share the top three.

The first one was the fear of a nuclear war. Now granted, with the reduction in world tensions over the years, the nuclear war fear is somewhat subsided, but surely not gone if you are watching the nightly news. The second problem or fear was that of a worldwide famine and as we see the problems in the third world countries, that fear is still present. But the third fear or problem that was recognized by this research was the lack of leadership today.

If I was to ask each you to list the greatest leaders of our time what names would you come up with? If we surveyed the literature on leadership we would probably identify a few quickly – George Washington, Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Winston Churchill; Franklin Delano Roosevelt; Mahatma Gandhi; Albert Schweitzer; Albert Einstein; and Dr. Martin Luther King, may have all made your list by leaving their mark on leadership over the years. But isn't it a sad commentary in this world that we can only identify a very few great leaders from the past generation and before.

I further submit to you, that never in the history of Freemasonry has there been a greater need for effective, dynamic, prestigious leadership; particularly at a time when our members are staying away in droves from our Lodge meetings. I have mentioned before that we do not have a membership problem but rather we have an engagement problem. We have enough members to make Masonry in Ontario a great experience. Never in the history of Freemasonry has there been a greater need for leadership, particularly when we have so many inquiring men standing outside the West gate waiting for their chance to be admitted to the mysteries and privileges of Freemasonry. Yes

Brethren, leadership, is desperately needed for the survival of Freemasonry at this time. That is why I return to this topic so often: Leadership, and the survival of Freemasonry.

Let me pose a few more questions to you. Can Freemasonry, as we know it, survive well into the twenty-first century and beyond? I believe it can! In sales terms, we have a good product. I want to quote our Brother, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, in his philosophy of positive thinking - "As long as there are God fearing, moral men, Freemasonry will exist well into the twenty-first century." Can Freemasonry under its present form and structure exist well into the twenty-first century? Freemasonry will survive - and thrive - well into the twenty first century and beyond with God fearing and moral man, --- and leadership! An aside here - I have no doubt that Bro. Peale's Masonic training, though a Protestant Clergyman, would have him, as do I, use the term God as a universal term of reference to our own Supreme Being.

So what do we mean by the term leadership in Masonic terms?

Given my monthly limitation of 700 words in this forum, you will have to tune in next month for this explanation on the importance of Masonic leadership.

The Lodges that continued to communicate and engage their members emerged from the covid pandemic in pretty good condition. Successful Lodges have provided full evenings of activity in the fellowship afterwards. The followed by Education Chairmen have been quite busy visiting and giving their talks which are enjoyed very much. These Lodges are embracing the wishes of our Grand Master and are following the teachings of Ritual. Education and Mentoring. A great addition to the social activities would be to involve the spouses and families and likeminded men that are wishing to submit an application to join our Craft. Printing the entire collection of Mentoring Matters and putting them into a binder to be used as a Lodge Resource is a great suggestion for successful Lodges. Mentoring will help all Lodges to be



We have to want to do better in order to succeed Brethren, we have to work on retaining our current membership as well as attracting new prospective members. It's not easy to turn the ship around but if we stay together, it's not impossible either.

As always Brethren, let us rub and cherish our shiny penny, plan for a bright future, keep our Lodges vibrant and make someone smile today and tomorrow.

## Behind The Masonic Symbols: The Cornerstone

We explore in this blog the history behind the cornerstone, a symbol initiates first learn about in the Entered Apprentice Degree and central to one of the fraternity's best-known public ceremonies.



Traditional Masonic Cornerstone; The Educator

In contrast to the sacrifices and superstitions of ancient times, Freemasons in their ceremonies have made the cornerstone a symbol of the individual Mason and the sacrifices of labor and time necessary to build a moral and Masonic edifice. Today we hollow out the cornerstones, placing small objects inside, like coins, photographs, newspapers, or a list of those who erected the building; it's wholly up to the committee in charge's imagination. This tradition includes a subtle nod to its origin; in Freemasonry, he who hunts for the symbol behind the symbol will find from the cornerstone the need of sacrifice in time, effort, and thought at the beginning of every effort and of one's Masonic journey. Every Mason must make these sacrifices if they choose to play an integral part in bettering themselves and the lives of those in their communities.

The cornerstone also symbolizes sturdiness, morality, and truth. At his first initiation, the Mason is tasked with erecting a spiritual temple in his heart, drawing symbolic parallels to the strong, trusty cornerstone; without which, a building (symbolically, the Mason's mind and heart) cannot stand. In ceremony, the Entered Apprentice is typically placed in the northeast corner of the Lodge as a figurative cornerstone; this signifies the unity of the North (darkness), and the East (light). The initiate learns and understands the necessity of integrity, stability of conduct, of truthfulness and uprightness of character, and of purity and holiness of life. He is also charged with maintaining all these virtues. These characteristics are all associated with the strength and durability of the physical cornerstone. It is customary for Masons to lay the cornerstones of public buildings through ceremony traditionally with the stone placed in the northeast corner of the foundation.

Physical cornerstones used in ceremonies in which Masons are erecting buildings traditionally show the date, the name of the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master, and the Masonic emblem. Cornerstones have been part of the construction or dedication of many federal

buildings and seats of state government since the beginnings of our country. Bro. Benjamin Franklin, while Grand Master of Pennsylvania, established the tradition beginning with the cornerstone laying of the state house in Philadelphia, and Bro. George Washington laid the cornerstone of our nation's Capitol building. Today, Freemasons around the country are proud to carry on the tradition that our forefathers began centuries ago. We are also proud to uphold truth and the moral characteristics associated with the cornerstone, and understand the necessary sacrifices we must make to better our lives and communities. Such sacrifices in pursuit of character and truth are necessary to live into the promise of its symbolism in our degrees.

# Lodge Resources: The Cornerstone Program

Brethren.

As the District's Lodge Resources Chairman, I have recently been tasked with looking at the participation of the District Lodges in the Cornerstone Certification Program. Our District does not have a rich history of participation in the program to date, which may be due to the once "laborious" application process of the program in the past. It involved collecting a lot of data, in a hard copy format, filling out all the forms for each of the criteria and then handing those into the chairman, all at one time. I have done this for my lodge, and yes it was a lot of work, so I know the issues that some may have experienced.

The process now is so much more streamlined, and all documents can be submitted electronically as they are completed during the process. They also get sent to the District's DDGM, no matter in which year your Lodge may be submitting its evidence in the application cycle. They are then signed off on and logged as complete.

In my inquiry with the District Lodges, to see where we are in regard to the Cornerstone program, some Lodges replied that they were focusing on just getting their members back into Lodge and didn't have time for the project. All the criteria that are listed in the Cornerstone Program illustrate what all our Lodges should be accomplishing on a yearly basis to begin with, which are the hallmarks of a healthy Lodge.

Is there a better way to get your brethren back into Lodge than to try fulfilling these criteria? Try something new in order to fulfill these requirements, organize a group of brethren to go visit another lodge. One criterion down, now move onto another. Over the span of the year, you might find that the process is not that difficult at all and will help grow your membership.

The Cornerstone Program may be a way to reinvigorate your Lodge and motivate your members to come back to Lodge after the long Covid lay off.
