

#### Short History of the Romanian People Who are we, the Romanian people?

Our people have ancient roots; born in time immemorial, as a branch of the great Thracian people, who lived at the North and South of the Danube River, beyond the Tisa River to the West and beyond the Nistru River to the East. We know all this from archaeological findings that brought to light archaic pottery and metal culture that flourished more than 5 000 years ago.

Romania spans today over a territory of more than 237 500 square km, having a complex geography: forest-covered mountains, fields crossed by an extended network of rivers, the Delta of the Danube River and the 275 km long Black Sea coastline. The Carpathian Mountain Range, with peaks over 2 500 meters high, mark the limits of three historical regions inhabited by Romanian people: Wallachia, Moldavia and Transylvania. These three regions, together with Dobrudja, got united in three stages, to form today's Romania.

On the 24<sup>th</sup> of January 1859, Wallachia and Moldavia elected the same ruler, namely Alexandru Ioan Cuza, and together they became one country, Romania. It took 20 years more for the province of Dobrudja to be incorporated into Romania, on the 14<sup>th</sup> of November 1878, following the Independence War, which brought about the liberation of the Romanian people from the dominance of the Ottoman Empire. 40 years later, on the 1<sup>st</sup> of December 1918, the Great National Assembly adopted the historical decision proclaiming the union of the provinces of Transylvania, Banat, Crişana and Maramureş to Romania, founding what we call today 'Greater Romania'.

There are plenty of written historical sources, even from the Antiquity, that provide information about the inhabitants of our lands and their society.

Great Greek historian Herodot (who lived in the 5<sup>th</sup> century B.C.), known as 'the father of history', described the Dacians, as a branch of the Thracian people, having the belief that 'they are immortal' and sending praises to a god called Zalmoxis. Herodot talks about the courage of the Dacians, considering them 'the bravest and the fairest of the Thracians'.

Publius Ovidius Naso (43 B.C. – 18 A.D.), born on the 20<sup>th</sup> of March 43 B.C., in the town of Sulmo (modern-day Sulmona, Italy), was one of the most prominent poets of the Augustan age. Despite his success, in the year 8 A.D., he was exiled by the Roman Emperor Augustus to the city of Tomis (modern-day Constanța), by the Black Sea. In his work, *Epistulae ex Ponto* (Letters from the Black Sea), he mentions the Dacians as being fierce, ruthless warriors who lived in a land constantly exposed to danger such as the attacks of the surrounding tribes and rough meteorological conditions. In his book *Tristia* (Sorrows), Ovid describes the city of Tomis as follows:

'Snow falls, and, once fallen, no rain or sunlight melts it, since the north wind, freezing, makes it permanent.'

The inscriptions and the monuments the Romans built after conquering Dacia are another important historical source about our ancestors. The most impressive monument is Trajan's Column, built in Rome to celebrate Emperor Trajan's victory over the Dacian king Decebalus, the son of Scorillo. The bas reliefs we see sculpted on the Column provide us with a detailed visual description of the wars between the Dacians and the Romans, and we can see both the landscape and numerous details of life in Dacia, and Roman war tactics and military technique.

These ancient sources show us a complex image of the Dacians, depicting them as brave warriors and skilled political leaders living in a society with strong traditions and beliefs, but also as a source of great riches for the Roman Empire.

Following the wars between the Dacians and the Romans in 101-102 and 105-106 A.D., part of the territory was occupied by the Romans, becoming thus a Roman province. After 270 A.D., when the Romans retreated to the South of the Danube, for around 700 years, the romanised population living on this territory was subject to the attacks and influence of the migratory people coming from the Eastern Asian plains looking for better pastures. Some of them settled close by, like the Hungarians and the Bulgarians, others just passed through, such as the Huns, the Avars, the Gepids, the Cumans or the Mongols, around 1240, in their haste towards other lands. After the Fall of Constantinople, the capital of the Eastern Roman Empire, in 1453, for about 500 years, the Romanian territory fell under the dominance of the Ottoman Empire, with all the consequences this entailed, a dominance from which no Balkan people was spared.

In mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, Dobrudja was one of the important provinces of the Ottoman Empire and the relative stability of the local administration made it possible for numerous foreign travellers to visit the region for very different reasons: commercial, diplomatic, ecclesiastic, military or scientific. A particular group of travellers were the foreign writers, among them being Hans Cristian Andersen, the great Danish storyteller, Franz Seraphim Grillparzer, Austrian poet and playwright, Leo Tolstoy, the great Russian writer, Alphonse de Lamartine, the well-known French poet, and so on.

The Romanian historian Tănase Bajduveanu, mentions in his work, *The French Constanța – French travellers to Dobrudja* ('Constanța franceză – călători francezi în Dobrogea'), that Jules Verne was one of those who came to these lands some time after 1882. He travelled by boat on the Danube to Sulina, a town that was designated *porto franco* in 1870, that is, a free town, not subject to custom duties. Sulina was the most important port town on the Danube and the biggest town on the Black Sea; it hosted the headquarters of the European Commission of the Danube. Due to the railroad that connected Cernavodă to Constanța, Jules Verne visited Medgidia and found it a beautiful town. We should notice that Cernavodă Bridge, built over the Danube by the Romanian engineer Anghel Saligni, a bridge that connected the historical provinces of Wallachia and Dobrudja, was, when it was completed, in 1895, the longest bridge in Romania and the second longest one in Europe, with a total length of 2 556 m. Jules Verne walked the streets of the city of Constanța, by the Black Sea, and visited the towns of Tulcea and Chilia and the Babadag forest.

In two of his novels, *Keraban the Inflexible* (Kéraban-le-Têtu), published in 1873, and *The Danube Pilot* (Le Pilote du Danube), published posthumously in 1909, the subject-matter, the heroes and the landscapes show he is directly acquainted with Dobrudja and the Danube Delta. In addition, there are three more novels by Jules Verne that have a connection to our country: *Mathias Sandorf*, published in 1885, *Claudius Bombarnac*, published in 1891, and *The Carpathian Castle*, published in 1892.

Jules Verne describes Dobrudja as follows: 'the region consists of a peninsula formed by the bend of the Danube, which, after running North up to Galați, turns East, flowing into the Black Sea through several arms. The Turks call this land "the good country". This fruitful land is crossed by shepherds and the people are generally Wallachian'.

The city of Constanța was called Tomis when it was founded by the Greeks, in the 7<sup>th</sup> century B.C. Today it is an important economic, cultural and touristic centre, a vibrant city, with a rich history and a fascinating mix of cultural old and modern traditions. It is an ideal destination for those looking to explore both the natural wonders and the historical heritage of Romania.

The Port of Constanța, the biggest port on the Black Sea and the 4<sup>th</sup> biggest in Europe, is essential for the Romanian economy and is also a key logistic hub for international commerce.

Speaking about Europe, the area we also belong to, we must admit that it is there that the cradle of the modern civilisation can be found! Europe is the heir a huge treasure of cultural knowledge in areas such as mathematics, geometry, astronomy, arts, literature, which allowed for a rapid technological development, in the great scale of history.

Being part of Europe, we, the Romanians, could also benefit from the social and economic transformations, as well as from the European culture. We are proud to be able to list Romanian prominent figures who, having had access to high-level knowledge in important university centres from West-European capitals, contributed with significant achievements to the cultural heritage of humanity.

Petrache Poenaru (1799 – 1875), Romanian inventor, educator, engineer and politician, is well known internationally for having invented the first fountainpen, patented in Paris in 1827. His invention revolutionised the way people wrote, eliminating the need to frequently dip the pen in the inkwell and providing a more efficient and practical method for writing. Henri Coandă (born on the 7<sup>th</sup> of June 1886 in Bucharest – died on the 25<sup>th</sup> of November 1972 in Bucharest, Romania) was a world-known Romanian engineer, physicist and inventor, famous primarily for his contributions to the development of aviation and the discovery of the Coandă effect.

In 1910, Henri Coanda designed and built the first aircraft propelled by a jet engine, known as 'Coandă 1910', which he tested on an airdrome in France, piloting it himself. During his lifetime, he patented over 250 inventions with applicability in various areas.

Gogu Constantinescu (1881-1965), Romanian engineer and scientist, panted, before the First World War, a device that could fire between the blades of a propeller on a plane, irrespective of the speed of the propeller. He also contributed to the development of the automatic gearbox. He spent most of his life in the United Kingdom, where he had over 400 inventions patented.

Constantin Brâncuşi was one of the greatest sculptors of the 20<sup>th</sup> century and a pioneer of modern art. Arriving to Paris at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, 'an illustrious unknown', he managed to revolutionise the artistic world with his innovative sculptures and his minimalist approach, at once simplified and profoundly symbolic.

Also in Paris, the capital of universal culture and the birthplace of the *Belle Époque*, Eugen Ionescu, the father of the Theatre of the Absurd, became a key figure of the Parisian theatre scene.

Nicolae Paulescu, Doctor in Medicine and Science, was a Romanian scholar, physician, and physiologist, famous for contributing to the discovery of insulin, the hormone that is essential for regulating glycemia and for the treatment of diabetes.

Last but not least, I would like to mention the Romanian physicist Theodor Ionescu, the inventor of the 3D cinema.

I shall stop here with my presentation. I am aware that I did not touch upon many of the subjects I could have talked about. I just tried to give an overview of some of the most representative moments in our history and culture, so that it is easier to get to know us better.

So mote it be!
