From Grand Lodge

The College of Masonry Course Revisions

The College of Freemasonry, under the authority of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario offers a modular course of study in this Grand Jurisdiction. The modules cover studies in:

Masonic Arts and Sciences for Masons – open to all M. M.s
Aspiring Worshipful Masters’ Course –open to all M. M.s
Past Masters’ Course (Formerly DDGM and Grand Registrar Course) – restricted to P. M.s only.

The learner may take an individual module, or enrol in a whole course, depending on his needs at the time, or as set out in Section 50 (b) of the Book of Constitution for the position of DDGM or Grand Registrar. A certificate will only be awarded upon the satisfactory completion of all parts of a given course.

The purpose of any of the courses of study offered by the College of Freemasonry in this Jurisdiction is to enable each Mason to become aware of the richness of the Masonic experience through the study of history, philosophy and symbolism related to Freemasonry.

The study will enable the Mason to establish a deeper meaning through the conscious examination of Masonic teachings.

Tuition

Masonic Arts and Sciences

To complete the Masonic Arts and Sciences Course, one must complete Modules 1 through 17. They can be taken in any order; however, the preferred order is 1 through 17.

\$135.00 for the Course– \$10.00 per Module

Past Master’s Course

**Formerly titled “District Deputy Grand Master Preparation Course” and mandatory for those aspiring to the position of District Deputy Grand Master or Grand Registrar.

** \$50.00 for the Course

Aspiring Worshipful Master’s Course

To complete the Aspiring Worshipful Master’s course of study, one must complete Modules 1, 2, 7, 11, 14, 15, 16, 17.

\$50.00 for the Course – \$10.00. Per Module

Training and Education

The training and education material contained in the study areas is intended to strengthen the individual Mason, the Lodge, the District and support Grand Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction.

The outcomes of the courses in terms of learning are to produce knowledgeable, well-read and articulate Masons and to provide opportunities for discussion. Learning is always a work in progress. The goal is to light the lamp of learning for each individual Mason and for each Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction.

The study courses do not tell you what to think, nor tell you how to think, but they do give you something to think about.

The course of study in the Masonic Arts and Sciences is built around the idea that “Education is not received – it is achieved.” If you don’t work at it, it won’t work for you.

Each module can be taken individually. Thus the learner can take only a small part of the course, for which he will be given credit. He can then take only those modules in which he is particularly interested or continue to take modules until such time as he has completed the whole course. A final course certificate will be awarded once ALL of the modules for this course have been completed.

To be eligible to enrol in the Past Master’s Course you must be a Past Master of a Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction. Please check the eligibility requirements as set out in the Book of Constitution, Section 50 (a) and (b).

To complete the Past Master’s Course, the applicant must complete Modules 1, 2, 7, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18.

Note – If one takes a module on its’ own, an exemption will be granted for this module if one chooses to complete a course in whole at a later date.

A certificate will be issued upon successful completion of each course of study.

The 18 Modules are as follows:

2. Justice in Masonry – Masonic Offences, Grievances and Appeals, Justice, Body of Masonry, Landmarks
3. Religion in Masonry – District Chaplain, Grand Chaplain, Religion, V.O.S.L., 3 Questions to the Applicant, Memorial Services
4. Masonry in Public – Committee on Blood Donors, Public Relations, Policy, The Bulletin, Involvement, Solicitation, Sponsors, Committee of Inquiry

5. Buildings and Relations – Lodge Buildings, Fraternal Relations, Grand Representatives, Masonic Holdings
- 6.a Philosophy and Symbolism – Initiation through raising (1)
- 6.b Philosophy and Symbolism – Initiation through raising (2)
7. Protocol and Etiquette – What to do, how to do it, and the right way.
8. The Beginnings – Early Traditions/Operative Masonry, Move to Speculative Masonry, Development of Grand Lodge, Org. in England
9. Masonry in North America – Masonry in Canada and USA, The Prov. G. Lodges
10. Our Jurisdiction – Independence and the Period to 1874, The Period 1875 - 1900, The Period 1900 - 1990
11. Masonic Lodge – By-Laws, Committees, Finance, Budgets, Meetings, Order of Business.
12. The District – D.D.G.M., Relationship to the Lodge, Relationship to Grand Lodge, District Committees, District Finance
13. Grand Lodge – Board of General Purposes, Standing Committees, Special Committees, Elections, Grand Lodge Finance

18. Past Masters – Restricted to P. M.s ONLY

THE LODGE SEAL OF VALLEY LODGE No. 100



At the 99th meeting of the Lodge held on Wednesday, December 2, 1863, a committee was appointed by the Worshipful Master W. Bro. James Mahon “to procure a devise for a seal and report at the next regular meeting”.

The next mention of the seal in the Lodge minutes was on Wednesday, June 1, 1864 (109th meeting of the lodge) when the Bro. Secretary (Chairman of


the committee appointed the previous December) presented a design for a lodge seal and Bros. Fairgrieve and Gartshore were empowered by the W. M. to confer with the Grand Secretary and examine with him the Masonic emblems on the design and after the G. S.’s concurrence, to get a seal for the lodge.

At the meeting on March 1, 1865, the Bro. Secretary presented an account for a seal from the Estate of G. H. Vanormens for a seal which was referred to the finance committee for payment. We can only presume that the Bro. Secretary was in possession of the seal at this time.

Our Lodge seal contains a myriad of Masonic symbolism, including:

- The Square and Compasses,
- The Three Great Lights,
- The Three Lesser Lights,
- The Twin Pillars,
- The Sun, The Moon
- The Letter “G”,
- The All Seeing Eye,
- and a crossed Gavel and Chisel.

The inclusion of the chisel and mallet, as the working tools of an Entered Apprentice are quite appropriate to the character of Valley Lodge, as there has been a long standing tradition of “Work Bees” in which the Brethren come together in operative labour, to maintain our beloved Temple on Main St., which we have occupied since 1875. Our most recent project being the rejuvenation of our buildings façade, which is scheduled to be completed before our fall meetings begin.



The new Valley Lodge logo (as of 2012), was designed by W. Bro. John Mackay, and is taken from an image which appears on the West face of our original Altar cloth. The image portrays an early depiction of the Dundas Valley, from which our Lodge has taken its name.

Who's In Charge Here?

Valley Lodge No. 100

W. Bro. Scott Lehane

Born in New York City, Scott was brought to Canada at the age of seven days old and raised in Hamilton. At the age of 12 his family moved to Rockton. From 1985-1990, he attended Highland Secondary School in Dundas, graduating with several scholarships. He attended the University of Toronto from 1990-1995.



From his first day in University, he volunteered with the college newspaper – *The Gargoyle*. He was a regular contributor throughout his University years, primarily writing film reviews. During his years at University of Toronto, he also served as an associate editor of the popular Canadian literary magazine, *Blood & Aphorisms*, and the founding editor of *The ESU*

Literary Journal, while writing for several other college and community papers.

After University, Scott briefly wrote for *The Hamilton Spectator* before landing a full-time job at the Toronto publishing house Crailer Communications as an assistant editor. In 1996 he was promoted to managing editor of a new publication called *ETR: Canada's National Communications Journal* – covering TV and radio broadcasting and film and TV production.

In 2000, he relocated to New York to serve as managing editor of the U.S. trade publications *Film & Video* and *DTV Business*.

In 2003, Scott along with childhood friend and long-time collaborator Thomas Chappel, undertook an ambitious documentary project in El Salvador. Scott returned to Canada at that time to finish postproduction of the independent film – *El Pueblo Unido*, which premiered at the 2004 Montreal World Film Festival to sold-out audiences, and toured other film festivals, including several screenings that raised money for Salvadoran charities.

Scott was drawn to Freemasonry after his experiences in El Salvador where he witnessed first-hand the tremendous injustice in the world, as well as the power of the human spirit to overcome adversity. At that time, he reconnected with an old friend, (Bro. Brad Craig), and, after a lot of beating around the bush, finally asked, “Hey, do you think you can get me in?”

Scott was initiated in Valley Lodge No. 100 in 2005, and passed and raised in 2006.

For the past three years, Scott has served as the editor of *Below the Line*, a highly successful daily trade publication covering film and TV production.

Wardrope Lodge No. 555

W. Bro. Jason McCulloch

Jason was born in Glasgow, Scotland. After having left Merchiston Castle School in the Fall of 1986, Jason embarked on a round-the-world adventure. On arriving in Canada, as a part of that trip, he was so enamoured with



Georgian Bay and the Canadian shield that he decided to immigrate to Canada. In 1989 Jason become a permanent resident of Canada

Jason married soon after arriving in Canada, to his wife, Annie, and has two sons, Michael and Rowen, who were born in Vancouver and Hamilton. Having spent a considerable number of years in the roofing business, Jason joined

Sealtek Flat roofing company, based in Burlington, where he runs the Production Department.

Jason has been an artist for many years and has exhibited and sold his work in Vancouver, Toronto and Hamilton. He developed a style of art he refers to as Chaos impressionism. His pursuit of the unseen that inexorably binds the ‘cause,’ has been the driving force in the production of his work. He is currently working on a commissioned piece for a Hamilton dentist.

Jason was initiated, passed and raised in Wardrope Lodge and was installed as the Worshipful Master in May of this year. He is currently serving as District Chaplain for Hamilton Masonic District C for the third consecutive year. He is an 18th degree Scottish Rite Mason and a Companion of Hamilton Chapter. Jason counts the mentorship of great Masons who have quietly encouraged, listened and advised on Masonry as his teachers, and whose confidence in him, help facilitate his advancement to that most respected chair in Masonry.

The Past Masters' Association of the Three Hamilton Districts

In 1902, the Past Masters of the Lodges in Hamilton District 8 instituted an association to promote visitation and harmony among the Past Masters of the district. As a result of continual



interest and growth in Masonry, District 8 was divided in 1923 into Hamilton A and Hamilton B and by 1974, it was necessary to create a third district, District C. Throughout this time, the Past Masters' Association held to its mission of promoting, developing and disseminating the principles of Masonry

and the opportunity for fellowship and education.

As of May 2012, the Association had 239 members with an almost equal balance of Officers, Directors and members from each of the three Hamilton districts. The D.D.G.M.s of Districts A, B and C are all ex-officio Directors of the Associations, as is the President of the Craft Association of the Hamilton Masonic Districts. The membership fee is a nominal amount making membership accessible to all Past Masters. Membership has great advantages.

Over the last few years, our meeting format has evolved into three breakfast meetings and a Friday Night A.G.M. in May. The breakfast meetings have always included an interesting guest speaker. Over the past few years, speakers have included the Grand Master, the Fire Chief of the City of Hamilton, an undercover RCMP officer and prominent masons from Hamilton, such as R.W. Bro. Wayne Elgie, and from other Masonic jurisdictions, such as R.W. Bro. Paul Sabo of Buffalo.

Our A.G.M. dinner meeting gives the members of the three Hamilton Districts an opportunity to meet those brethren who are running for the various offices of Grand Lodge. This is always a highlight and the new executive of the Past Masters' Association are chosen.
